

## **SCHEDULE 10: APPENDIX 3 BREED SPECIALISATION COURSE KUSA BREED JUDGES LEARNING PROGRAMME**

(Effective 01-10-2019)

The Breed Specialisation Course is a Level 2 course that specialises in a single Breed, as determined and made available by the Kennel Union Judges' Department. (Note: The Applicant must contact the JEC Administrator to establish which Breed Specialisation Courses are offered).

### **1. QUALIFYING CRITERIA**

- 1.1. If not already successfully completed, the Applicant must follow the requirements of Level 1 and pass the Paper 1 examination before embarking on a Breed Specialisation Course (*See Schedule 10, Appendix 1*).
- 1.2. If, after passing Paper 1, it is the Learner Judge's first entry to Level 2, and the choice has been made to study a Breed Specialisation Course first, no other Course may be studied simultaneously.
- 1.3. On the successful completion of Level 1 or further, a Provisional, Licensed or Senior Judge may study the Breed Specialisation Course simultaneously with one (1) other Level 2 Group Course or the Junior Showmanship Course or another Breed Specialisation Course if he/she meets any additional qualifying criteria according to the relevant Breed Club(s)/Council (if applicable).

### **2. APPLICATION**

- 2.1. A Learner, Provisional, Licensed or Senior Judge wishing to apply to follow the Breed Specialisation Course must submit the required application form to the JEC Administrator.

### **3. SUPPORT MATERIAL**

- 3.1. The Learner Judge will be granted access to a comprehensive Study Guide outlining details of the requirements of the relevant Breed Specialisation Course and how to approach each module.
- 3.2. The recommended and compulsory reading includes:
  - 3.2.1. the current, relevant Breed Standard on the KUSA website
  - 3.2.2. any number of other reliable sources
  - 3.2.3. reading material recommended by the relevant Breed Club(s) or Council(s)
- 3.3. In all written assignments, the Learner Judge must supply a full bibliography of all resources used as follows:
  - 3.3.1. **Books:** Author. *Title*. Edition. Location. Publisher. Year  
(eg. Beauchamp, Richard G. *Solving the Mysteries of Breed Type*. 2<sup>nd</sup> Ed. New Jersey, USA. Kennel Club Books. 2008)
  - 3.3.2. **Articles:** Author. Title. Publication. Year  
(eg. Orlandi, Claudia Waller. *Practical Canine Anatomy & Movement*. Breed University Course. 2006)
  - 3.3.3. **Internet:** Author. Title. URL  
(eg. Bull. T. *How Bullies Fly*. [www.bullterriersfromouterspace.com/howbulliesfly.html](http://www.bullterriersfromouterspace.com/howbulliesfly.html))

### **4. MENTORSHIP AND ASSESSMENT**

- 4.1. The Learner Judge will be assigned a qualified Breed Specialist Mentor, who will guide, advise, support and assess the Learner Judge's performance for the duration of the Course.

- 4.2. The assigned Breed Specialist Assessor will be required to attend and observe the judging of at least one (1) of the Learner Judge's judging appointments at Non-Championship Shows and provide feedback on the Learner Judge's judging technique, ring management and judging decisions - encouraging and advising best practices where applicable.
- 4.3. The Learner Judge will be required to liaise with the assigned Breed Specialist Assessor on a suitable occasion to conduct the observation and assessment.

## **5. COURSE REQUIREMENTS**

- 5.1. The Learner Judge is encouraged to consult with his/her assigned Breed Specialist Mentor for guidance and support, for the duration of the entire Course.
- 5.2. The order of progression through the Breed Specialisation Course is prescribed as follows:
  - 5.2.1. Breed Test, to be followed by
  - 5.2.2. the Breed Hallmarks Assignment, whereafter a Learner Judge may be cleared for
  - 5.2.3. Judging Appointments with Critiques.
  - 5.2.4. at any time during the course of study, the Learner Judge may:
    - 5.2.4.1. complete the Shadow Judging Module
    - 5.2.4.2. complete the Ring Stewardship Module
    - 5.2.4.3. accumulate the required number of Learning Encounters
    - 5.2.4.4. research and complete the Breed Assignment
  - 5.2.5. Portfolio submission
- 5.3. Assessment will be conducted for each module, either during or after completion.
- 5.4. Eligibility for the Paper 2 examination depends on the approval of the Portfolio, which serves as proof of successful completion of all modules.

## **6. MODULES**

### **6.1. BREED TEST**

The rationale for this module is to cultivate familiarity with the location and content of the relevant, current Breed Standard and to ensure a thorough understanding of the Breed before entering the ring to judge them.

- 6.1.1. The Learner Judge completes the relevant Breed Test.
- 6.1.2. The JEC Administrator will forward the Breed Test to the Learner Judge. Once completed, the Learner Judge will forward the Breed Test to the assigned Breed Specialist Mentor who will be responsible for assessing it.
- 6.1.3. The test comprises questions on elements of the relevant Breed Standard. The Learner Judge must consult the current Breed Standard – available on the KUSA website – in order to answer the questions correctly. ([www.kusa.co.za/index.php/documents/breed-standards](http://www.kusa.co.za/index.php/documents/breed-standards)).
- 6.1.4. The pass mark for the Breed Test is 100%. The Learner Judge may not be cleared to progress further until the Breed Test has been successfully completed.
- 6.1.5. If initially unsuccessful, the Learner Judge will have the opportunity to revise or redo the Breed Test until a successful pass mark is attained.
- 6.1.6. The Breed Test must be stored in the Portfolio.

### **6.2. BREED HALLMARKS ASSIGNMENT**

The rationale for this module is to encourage the Learner Judge to identify the most important Breed Hallmarks and specific Characteristics of the relevant Breed in order to be completely attuned to them and to present these in a format most useful for the Learner Judge's individual style of learning and for practical use during judging.

- 6.2.1. The Learner Judge prepares a brief list of Breed Hallmarks and specific Characteristics that succinctly encapsulate the essence of the relevant Breed.
- 6.2.2. The Learner Judge is advised to consult his/her assigned Breed Specialist Mentor plus the support material available to guide the successful completion of this module (*See the Study Guide: "How to prepare the Breed Hallmarks Assignment"*).
- 6.2.3. The Learner Judge will be expected to prepare this assignment in a format of his/her own choice in order to facilitate his/her own particular learning style and practical application.
- 6.2.4. The Learner Judge must submit the completed Breed Hallmarks Assignment to his/her assigned Breed Specialist Mentor for assessment.

- 6.2.5. If initially unsuccessful, the Learner Judge will have the opportunity to revise or redo the assignment until the appropriate Breed Hallmarks and specific Characteristics have been successfully identified.
- 6.2.6. The Learner Judge may not be cleared to progress further until the Breed Hallmarks Assignment has been successfully completed.
- 6.2.7. The Breed Hallmarks Assignment must be stored in the Portfolio for later assessment, but the Learner Judge is encouraged to use the list practically during future judging assignments.

### 6.3. JUDGING APPOINTMENTS

The rationale for this module is to gain practical experience in the multi-skilled task of judging at Conformation Shows. The writing of brief Critiques encourages the finding of sound reasons for judging decisions and promotes a culture of positive judging.

- 6.3.1. The Learner Judge may accept and will be cleared for judging appointments on the successful completion of the Breed Test and Breed Hallmarks Assignment (*See Regs. 6.1. and 6.2. above*).
- 6.3.2. The Learner Judge will need to judge:
  - 6.3.2.1. at least forty (40) exhibits of the relevant Breed, on which brief Critiques are written
  - 6.3.2.2. at a minimum of two (2) Non-Championship Shows of which at least one (1) must be a Specialty Show, subject to Regulations 6.3.3 and 6.3.7 below.
- 6.3.3. At least one (1) of the Judging Appointments must be in a different geographical Centre from the one in which the Learner Judge is based, more if possible.
- 6.3.4. The Learner Judge must complete the standardised Critique form during his/her judging, in which details and numbers of the exhibits judged are entered, as well as a brief Critique on each exhibit judged.
- 6.3.5. On completion of the Judging Appointment, the Learner Judge must request the Show Secretary to endorse the Critique forms. The Show Secretary will acknowledge having signed off on Critique forms in the normal Return of Show Levies form, which is required to be forwarded to the KUSA Office and the JEC Administrator as per normal procedure.
- 6.3.6. On receipt of the Return of Show Levies form from the Show Secretary, the KUSA Judges' Department and JEC Administrator will record and update the Learner Judge's progress and grant clearance for future Judging Appointments. No clearance for future Judging Appointments shall be granted without this procedure having been completed correctly.
- 6.3.7. At least one (1) Judging Appointment must be observed by the assigned Breed Specialist Assessor (*see 4.3.*), which Appointment may only take place in the geographical Centres of Gauteng, Western Cape or KwaZulu-Natal, in accordance with the administrative division set out in Schedule 3, Regulation 2.1.1.
- 6.3.8. The assigned Breed Specialist Assessor will provide feedback and guidance on the Learner Judge's performance and endorse the completed Critiques immediately on completion of the judging assignment.
- 6.3.9. The Learner Judge must store all Critiques in the Portfolio.
- 6.3.10. On completion of all requirements outlined in Reg 6.3. – Judging Appointments, the Learner Judge may continue to judge at Non-Championship Shows in any geographical Centre without assessment or writing of Critiques until the Learner Judge feels ready to sit the examination.

### 6.4. SHADOW JUDGING

The rationale for this module is to grant the Learner Judge an opportunity to experience some of the typical challenges and situations within the ring at Championship Show level by closely observing the techniques and decisions of an experienced Judge, together with the opportunity to participate and practice with feedback and professional guidance.

- 6.4.1. The Learner Judge selects to shadow a Licensed Judge with at least 5 years' experience in the relevant Breed, or an International Judge, at a Specialist Championship Show.
- 6.4.2. The Learner Judge must apply in writing – at least 2 weeks before the event – to the Show Secretary, who shall request permission from the Officiating Judge on the Learner Judge's behalf.
- 6.4.3. Learner Judges who fail to follow the procedure in Reg. 6.4.2. above, may risk forfeiting credit for the relevant Shadow Judging session.
- 6.4.4. The Learner Judge must be present in good time before judging commences and must remain until the end of judging in order to participate in the Officiating Judge's feedback and guidance.
- 6.4.5. The Learner Judge accompanies and observes the Officiating Judge's technique as closely as possible in the ring without excessive intrusion. The Learner Judge is not permitted to spend the duration of the Shadow Judging session seated at the judge's table under the gazebo.

- 6.4.6. Following the award of Best of Breed (Best in Specialty Show) and Best Puppy of Breed (Best Puppy in Specialty Show) by the Officiating Judge, the Learner Judge will be granted an opportunity to examine and move the Best in Specialty Show and Best Puppy in Specialty Show exhibits. The Learner Judge makes notes on the conformation and movement of the exhibits. The Learner Judge may request to examine, move and make notes on any additional Best Class in Specialty Show (Best Junior, Best Veteran, Best Baby Puppy, etc. in Specialty Show) winners.
- 6.4.7. Interactive involvement between the Learner Judge and Officiating Judge is to be encouraged in terms of judging and observation techniques (particularly with regard to the meaningful placement of hands and methods of measuring), but no public or overheard criticism of particular exhibits will be permitted.
- 6.4.8. A feedback session between the Learner Judge and Officiating Judge is advised in private after the assignment.
- 6.4.9. Proof of the Shadow Judging Assignment must be endorsed by the Officiating Judge.
- 6.4.10. The Learner Judge completes an Observation Report following the Shadow Judging session to be stored in the Portfolio.

## 6.5. BREED ASSIGNMENT

The rationale for this module is to encourage the Learner Judge to involve himself/herself in an in-depth study of the relevant Breed in order to gain better understanding of all aspects of the Breed over and above the Breed Standard, then to summarise and present this collected information into written format.

- 6.5.1. The Learner Judge prepares three (3) or four (4) essays (dependent on the content of the relevant Breed Specialisation Course) of approximately 300 - 500 words (half to one A4 typed page) on each the prescribed topics.
- 6.5.2. The Learner Judge must consult the relevant **Breed Specialist Study Guide** in the restricted area of the KUSA website, accessed through the Judges' Portal, for details on the Breed Assignment topics and advice on how to complete the assignment effectively.
- 6.5.3. The Learner Judge must research and write the required essays, which may be illustrated. Full bibliographic details must be provided (*See 3.3. above*). It is recommended that the Learner Judge allows sufficient time to devote his/her full attention to these Assignments.
- 6.5.4. It is recommended that the Learner Judge may approach the assigned Breed Specialist Mentor for guidance, but under no circumstances may the Breed Assignments be presented in any form other than the Learner Judge's own wording throughout.
- 6.5.5. Procedure for submission of Breed Assignment (Essay Topics) –
  - 6.5.5.1. The Learner Judge must forward the completed Assignment to the Specialist Assessor
  - 6.5.5.2. Upon completion of his/her assessment, the Specialist Assessor will forward the Breed Assignment to the Examiner for assessment.
  - 6.5.5.3. The Specialist Assessor and the Examiner will concur on the assessment prior to returning the Breed Assignment to the Learner Judge.
  - 6.5.5.4. Should the Breed Specialist Assessor and/or Examiner not approve of the Breed Assignment, feedback will be given to the Learner Judge on the areas requiring attention.

## 6.6. RING STEWARDSHIP

The rationale for this module is to increase opportunity for the Learner Judge to become fully familiar with procedures, rules and regulations within the ring. Working in the Breed ring being studied also allows considerable indirect learning in between ring stewarding duties.

- 6.6.1. The Learner Judge is required to attend and complete a Ring Stewardship Course or Seminar. Proof of attendance will be required if a Ring Stewardship Course or Seminar was attended prior to registering for the Breed Specialisation Course, in which case, credit will be given and compulsory attendance will not be necessary.
- 6.6.2. The Learner Judge is required to serve as a Ring Steward at a minimum of one (1) Non-Championship Show and one (1) Championship Specialty Show in the Breed ring the Learner Judge is studying.
  - 6.6.2.1. The Learner Judge may complete the one (1) Non-Championship Show Ring Stewardship appointment either at a Specialist Club Non-Championship Show or the Breed at a Group or All-Breeds Non-Championship Show.
  - 6.6.2.2. The Learner Judge must complete the one (1) Championship Show Ring Stewardship appointment at a Specialist Club Championship Show.
- 6.6.3. The Ring Stewardship appointments may be completed in any order and not necessarily before the first Judging Appointment, although this is strongly advised. The Learner Judge may serve additional

appointments as a Ring Steward in the Breed ring he/she is studying or any other Breed/Group, but these appointments will not be counted towards this module requirement.

- 6.6.4. Ring Stewardship experience gained before enrolment in the Breed Specialisation Course does not count towards this module requirement.
- 6.6.5. A Learner Judge may not serve a Ring Stewardship for the relevant Breed prior to one month of judging that Breed in the same Provincial area.
- 6.6.6. Proof of Ring Stewardship must be endorsed by the Show Secretary and stored in the Portfolio.

## 6.7. **LEARNING ENCOUNTERS**

The rationale for this module is to open the Learner Judge to a number of different learning opportunities that may offer various views of and insights into, the Breed being studied in order to form a balanced and supplementary knowledge of the Breed and also to inculcate a culture of life-long learning.

- 6.7.1. The Learner Judge must attend or participate in a minimum of four (4) Learning Encounters, of which:
  - 6.7.1.1. one (1) Breed Seminar/Workshop on the relevant Breed is compulsory, and
  - 6.7.1.2. the balance of at least three (3) Learning Encounters may comprise any or all of the following:
    - a) additional Breed Seminars/Workshops
    - b) private Breed discussions
    - c) online Breed Seminars/Presentations/Webcasts
    - d) privately-viewed Breed Presentations
    - e) Study Groups
    - f) Grooming Workshops (if applicable)
    - g) Shadow Judging at Non-Championship Shows (same procedure as Shadow Judging at Championship Shows refer *Reg 6.4. above*).
- 6.7.2. The Learner Judge must record full details of place, presenter, date, references and proof of attendance on standardised forms to be stored in the Portfolio.
- 6.7.3. All Learning Encounters – whether private or public – must be summarised and analysed.
- 6.7.4. Learner Judges are advised to consult the Study Guide: *“How to record your Learning Encounters”*.
- 6.7.5. Credit will be given for previously attended Seminars covering the Breed being studied, providing proof of attendance is provided.

## 6.8. **PORTFOLIO**

- 6.8.1. The Learner Judge keeps a Portfolio to record accomplishment of all learning modules.
- 6.8.2. Once the Learner Judge has completed all the requirements of the Level, the Portfolio is submitted to the assigned Breed Specialist Assessor for assessment.
- 6.8.3. The purpose of the assessment is to ensure that all modules have been completed at a standard sufficient enough to secure examination entrance. If there are Assignments that do not yet meet the required standard, these will be indicated by the Breed Specialist Assessor and the Learner Judge will be advised to rework Assignments where appropriate. Only the reworked tasks need to be resubmitted by the Learner Judge.
- 6.8.4. The Learner Judge is advised to consult the Study Guide: *“How to prepare your Portfolio”*.

## **7. EXAMINATION: BREED SPECIALISATION**

- 7.1. On the successful completion of the whole level of study, the Learner Judge may apply to sit the examination, Paper 2, without reference books or material, held usually in June or November.
- 7.2. The format of the examination will be multiple choice, labelling, long questions and an essay.
- 7.3. The content of the examination will cover:
  - 7.3.1. the KUSA Breed Standard
  - 7.3.2. the Breed Assignment (*See 6.5. above*)
  - 7.3.3. the Study Guide: Anatomy, Conformation and Movement
- 7.4. Paper 2 will carry 200 marks with a minimum pass requirement of 75%.
- 7.5. The duration of the examination shall be no longer than 2 hours.
- 7.6. The examination paper will be marked by the Examiner and moderated by at least one qualified Moderator before results are made known.
- 7.7. The Examination Candidate will be notified by the KUSA Judges' Department of his/her success or failure in the examination and a percentage mark shall be given.
- 7.8. If the Examination Candidate is successful, he/she may register with the JEC Administrator to begin studies for a new Course of study, if desired.

- 7.9. If the Examination Candidate is unsuccessful, he/she may register to rewrite the examination at any future examination opportunity.
- 7.10. A re-marking facility will be available on payment of a fee, as determined by the KUSA Office.

## **8. FINAL ASSESSMENT**

- 8.1. On the successful completion of the examination, the KUSA Judges' Department will acknowledge the Learner Judge as a Provisional Breed Specialist Judge until the final assessment is successfully completed.
- 8.2. A Provisional Breed Specialist Judge is permitted to judge at Non-Championship or Qualifying Shows and may award Challenge Certificates (CCs) at Championship Shows in the Breed for which he/she has passed the examination, subject to required time restrictions (*See Schedule 10, Reg. 3*).
- 8.3. The Provisional Breed Specialist Judge will be required to judge at least one (1) Championship Specialty Show appointment.
- 8.4. The JEC reserves the right to assign a Breed Specialist Assessor to observe the Provisional Judge's performance and provide feedback on a set of criteria that the Provisional Judge must meet in order to be approved as a Licensed Judge.
  - 8.4.1. If the assessment criteria are not met, the Provisional Breed Specialist Judge will need to fill a second Championship Show appointment with the same assessment criteria as above.
- 8.5. The Provisional Breed Specialist Judge is advised to consult the Study Guide: "*What to expect during your first Championship appointment*".
- 8.6. On the successful completion of the final assessment, the KUSA Judges' Department will acknowledge the Provisional Breed Specialist Judge as a Licensed Breed Specialist Judge.



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
