			"Any member nominated to sit on the Federal Council, Executive Committee of the Kennel Union as well as the Executive Members (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer) of any Provincial Council of the Kennel Union, shall declare within one (1) month of appointment to the Secretary in writing all their interests, of whatsoever nature, in dog related activities. Where the governing body of the Kennel Union, or such person or persons to whom the authority is

		delegated, determine that any interests are in conflict with those of the Kennel Union, such nominated members' appointment shall ipso facto be terminated.
	3.2.1	Fedco Members:
		It was noted that the interests of members of Fedco, as declared at Fedco 06-2023, had remained unchanged. The declaration of interests submitted by Dr Carolyn Chelchinskey subsequent to her appointment to Fedco as Vice-Chairman of DOGSPC was confirmed , unanimously . It was noted that, as with the other members of Fedco, none of her declared interests constituted any conflict with the activities or interests of KUSA.
	3.2.2	Exco Members:
		The interests of Exco members, as previously declared and re-confirmed at Fedco 12-2021, Fedco 06-2022, Fedco 12-2022 and Fedco 06-2023 had remained unchanged. 3	3.3	Annual Financial Statements (AFS) and Auditors' Report for the Year Ended 31.08.2023
		[Note: The AFS had been circulated by PM prior to the meeting, with a request to revert to her by close of business on Wednesday, 29 November 2023, with queries, or comments.]
		PM informed Fedco that she had received no queries, or comments, prior to the deadline and therefore assumed that the members of Fedco were satisfied that the AFS of KUSA, as prepared and endorsed by the Auditors, had been accurately and fairly stated and reported.
		PM briefly reflected on the financial performance of KUSA in the year under review and expressed her satisfaction that KUSA had managed to achieve satisfactory growth in a challenging economic environment. Although she highlighted a decline in some key revenue streams, as experienced by NCOs all over the world, she was grateful that KUSA had been able to mitigate these negative trends through disciplined financial prudence. Needless to say, negative trends would be closely monitored during the next financial year.
		The members of Fedco were united in their praise and appreciation for the positive results achieved in the 2022/2023 Financial Year and thanked PM for her effective management and leadership and BD for his diligent liaison with the Auditors on behalf of KUSA.
		On a proposal from LT, seconded by JH, the Audited Annual Financial Statements of the Kennel Union of Southern Africa for the year ended 31 August 2023 were approved, unanimously.
		[Note: The Chairman reminded the meeting that the Federal Council had unanimously approved KUSA's Operational Budget for 2023/2024 at Fedco 06-2023, which approval had been recorded in the Minutes of that meeting. Prior to its approval by Fedco, the Budget, as presented by PM, had been subjected to rigorous scrutiny by the Fedco Finance and Budget Portfolio-holders over two meetings designated for the purpose, before its final endorsement.
		Having reviewed the latest figures pertaining to KUSA's financial position and cashflow immediately preceding Fedco 12-2023, the Portfolio-holders agreed , unanimously , to propose to Fedco that the envisaged performance-based bonuses as provided in the Budget should be paid to members of staff, supplemented by inflation-related salary increases as from January 2024.]
		The Chairman informed Fedco that, since the Budget had been approved at Fedco 06-2023 and, since there would be no deviation from the prior approval obtained at Fedco 06-2023, she

		assumed that it would be in order to call for an appropriate resolution to formalise the payment of performance-related bonuses, commensurate with the outcome of performance appraisals, in
		December 2023, and salary increases, as from end-January 2024. There were no objections and, on a proposal from GR, seconded by MV, it was resolved, unanimously, that, upon completion of appraisals, a performance-based annual bonus should be paid to all KUSA staff members, and that staff salaries should be adjusted by increases as from the end of January 2024.

	The Chairman thanked Brig Gen (retd.) NJ du Preez for his many years of service to KUSA and expressed the hope that he would be prepared to continue serving as the organisation's Legal Adviser.
	Brig Gen (retd.) Du Preez indicated that it was an honour for him to serve KUSA in this capacity and declared his willingness to continue fulfilling the duties of Legal Adviser to KUSA.
	On a proposal from GR, seconded by MV and approved, unanimously, Brig Gen (retd.) NJ du Preez was appointed Legal Adviser to KUSA for the ensuing year.
3.5.8	Article 16.2.3 – Appeals Committee

"The Federal Council shall nominate at least three (3) members of the Federal Council, who shall act as an Appeals Committee on behalf of the Federal Council to consider any appeals lodged in terms of the Disciplinary Rules." [Note: It was customary for all Federal Councillors to be elected to the Appeals Committee. Three members were appointed to consider an Appeal, when necessary.] NdP informed the meeting that, over time, he had noticed a number of inconsistencies in the manner in which Appeals Committee Hearings have been conducted and reported and believed the time had come to appoint a "Standing Chairman" for Appeals. He proposed that this position should be filled by the person who, for the time being, held the office of Vice-Chairman of the Federal Council. Discussion ensued and further clarity was provided by NdP. In the interest of consistency in the manner in which criteria pertinent to Appeals were applied, the Chairman expressed her support for NdP's proposal and enquired whether any of the other members of Fedco held a different view. No dissenting views were expressed and the Chairman suggested that the proposal be formalised as a resolution of the Federal Council. On a proposal from GR, seconded by MV, it was resolved, unanimously, that, in future, the Vice-Chairman of the Federal Council, for the time being, should chair any Fedco Appeals Committee (FAC) as contemplated under Schedule 01 Rule 1.7. **Note:** The profile of the FAC is not formalised in Schedule 01, hence the regular confirmation in the Minutes of Fedco Meetings that the FAC shall, in every case, comprise three members of Fedco. In view of the above resolution, the chairmanship of the FAC would now become a supplementary element to Fedco's customary statement on the composition of the FAC. It might well be advisable to formalise the composition of the FAC in Schedule 1 in due course.] 3.6 **K9** Administration Upgrade Project Report-back from the KUSA Office. Status Report 2023/11/28



Project Vision

Our vision remains steadfast from our previous report in August: to develop a modern, web-based application for KUSA, enhancing the efficiency and effectiveness of its day-to-day operations. This application will continue to address the limitations and challenges posed by the existing, outdated system. We are committed to ensuring that the application is not only intuitive and user-friendly but also robust, maintaining the highest standards of data safety and security.

We persist in our goal to bridge the gap between KUSA's members and the organisation itself, fostering a more connected community. This vision includes the integration and streamlining of various systems to replace the current fragmented and partially manual K9 online system. Our focus remains on creating a cohesive, seamless experience for all users, reinforcing our commitment to this unaltered vision.

Project Health

Project health is good: Reflecting on our previous report in August, we had identified the project as being in a satisfactory state, with a performance spectrum ranging from average to good. At

that time, the majority of the significant tasks were accomplished, although it was recognised that certain areas required fine-tuning, especially in light of new rulings and process flow amendments.

Building on the solid foundation laid previously, the project has made remarkable strides. The application is in a testable state, now incorporating the critical functionalities necessary for KUSA's operational efficiency. The bulk of the application's sections are complete and have entered a phase where they are being tested by the SrsBsns Team and awaiting testing from the KUSA Testing Working Group. Currently, our focus is on making minor adjustments and refinements across the app to enhance its performance and to ensure that any bug found is fixed.

We have continued to advance the project, bringing it closer to fruition.

Completed To Date

"Completed" in this instance means they are in the User Acceptance Testing (UAT) Phase – and changes to suit KUSA's operations or adapt to new improvements may still be necessary.

Milestones:

Certificates

Working state for testing. The point calculator has been added to the application form to indicate the current total of points a user has whilst completing the application form. The application submission notifications have been set up, as well as completion of the approval process. Certificate pdf's can now be created and downloaded once they have been submitted and approved by Admin.

Database

The import process for the entirety of the historical data into the database is underway. The import of data from the current system has highlighted data integrity issues that have had to be accounted for. Duplicate and shared user details, as well as some critical data being omitted in the legacy system has caused issues with the import and has necessitated the need to create ways to handle these issues in order to import usable data into the new system. This has meant that the databases have had to be rebuilt, as some critical structures had to be refactored. The data is currently being copied to the new system with many data points already in and accessible.

Show Schedules

The development of the Show Schedule section has been completed. The Show Schedules are now generated by the system with the relevant data populating the generated pdf. This is also downloadable from within the application.

A public Show Schedule has been created, allowing users who do not have KUSA profiles to view upcoming event information. This is accessed through a button on the login screen. The viewable sections of the application are also limited as the user is not logged in.

Show Licences

The feature enabling the creation of downloadable Show Licences has been incorporated into the application, and is accessible through the shows section. Users can view the Licence online as well as download the pdf.

Notifications

The notifications that are sent to users and administrators have been updated throughout the application. These will need to be reviewed by the KUSA Testing Working Group in order to ensure that the copy and design of the mails have hit the mark.

A need for a notifications tab to allow authorised users to manage the content of notifications has been identified. The notifications tab has not yet been set up as this is an enhancement and another necessary piece of scope creep that has taken a backseat to the more pressing sections of the application that need to be completed first.

Testing

The SrsBsns teams testing remains an integral and ongoing activity. After all work is completed and merged to either the staging or development environments of the app, it is critical that all work be tested to ensure there are no conflicts or issues caused by the additional code.

SrsBsns is also reliant on user acceptance testing by the KUSA Testing Working Group – contemplated further below.

Milestones Outstanding

Certificates

Testing has highlighted some minor issues with this section that still need to be resolved. Things we are currently working on include: Member lookups hanging when running a search. The ruling around award certificates is being double checked and tested. Info pulled into the pdf requires alignment adjustments. The qualification requirement notes need to be adjusted, this is a copy change and will be changed once the rule logic testing has been completed.

Notifications

Notifications are in a testable state and need to be reviewed by the KUSA Testing Working Group in order to finalise design and copy required. The notifications tab in the menu will be added once all the critical sections of the application have been completed in full.

Database

The data in each environment is imported from a point in time backup of KUSA's data and mimics the environment and arrangement that will be used to go live with real data. The new KUSA system connects to both databases simultaneously and performs ETL (Extract Transform & Load) operations on the legacy data to populate the new database.

Testing

As the project advances through its various development stages, testing remains an integral and ongoing activity. This continuous testing protocol is instituted to ensure that each component and functionality is rigorously evaluated for performance, reliability, and compliance with specifications. We are at a stage where we need the KUSA Testing Working Group to start testing in order to provide notes and feedback so that the various sections of the application may be finalised.

Issues/Roadblocks

The biggest issue that we are currently facing is that the KUSA Testing Working Group has been unable to do much testing thus far due to their other Kusa commitments that have taken precedence. It is vital that Pascale be given enough time for testing and note-taking to ensure the sections of the application are in line with KUSA's processes and requirements.

Risks

- Unforeseen logic complexities that have not been catered for. Identified during user acceptance testing.
- Potential misunderstandings in the implementation of concepts. There may be issues
 within the logic created that have not been discovered and will only reveal themselves
 through use of the application.
- Payment gateway logic change. For instance: Post Paygate's purchase, Payfast has changed some of its functionality, this risk still exists as the two may merge various functions going forward.
- Unforeseen database and data structure complexities and nuances.
- Communication delays based on KUSA workload and capacity.
- Testing delays.

Timeline

The move to the User Acceptance Testing (UAT) Phase is a major step, highlighting our commitment to delivering a high-quality, efficient application. We are now focusing on resolving minor issues and finalising the application, with an emphasis on active participation from the KUSA Testing Working Group for essential feedback. Despite challenges, particularly in ensuring adequate testing time, the project's trajectory remains positive and on track to fulfil our vision of enhancing KUSA's operations through this technological advancement. **Future** Looking ahead, our focus is set on completing the final development stages and user acceptance testing, leading to the launch of the new application and the retirement of the old K9 Online System. Our next significant goal is to enhance the KUSA website, aligning it closely with the new application. This integration, which has been engineered into the new system, will streamline KUSA's operations, reducing administrative workload and improving efficiency. We are committed to this path of digital transformation, ensuring that these advancements bring tangible benefits to KUSA's day-to-day functions. Report noted. PM elaborated on some elements contained in the report and invited the members of Fedco to pose any questions or queries. NdP enquired whether a definitive end-date has been set for the project, to which PM replied that, given the unpredictability of problems which might be identified during the testing phase, it was unfortunately not possible to predict a specific date for the finalisation of the project. The members of Fedco expressed their thanks and appreciation to PM for her dedication to the project and also thanked the internal Testing Working Group, comprising CPA, NS, BD, Zainoe Petersen and Karene Karstadt, as well as the SrsBsns Team, for their perseverance. Noted. 3.7 **KUSA Office – Lease & Relocation** KUSA Office – Lease Agreement (Fedco 06.2021 Item 8.7, Fedco 12-2021 Item 3.10.1, Fedco 3.7.1 06-2022 Item 3.5.1, Fedco 12-2022 Item 3.7.1, Fedco 06-2023 Item 3.4.1) Report-back on the New Lease Agreement signed with AfricaWorks Group: PM informed the members of Fedco that, as she had reported prior to signature of the new lease agreement, due to certain compelling factors, AfricaWorks Group had substantially varied the rental terms for the current office space occupied by KUSA in Touchstone House. Although she had tried her best to hold AfricaWorks Group to the favourable terms negotiated for the preceding two years, escalation in the demand for office space in downtown Cape Town, coupled with an exponential escalation in rental fees. AfricaWorks Group was not able to extend the same concessions to KUSA which had been possible in a vastly different economic climate immediately post-COVID. KUSA was given the option of mitigating the increase somewhat by reducing its number of parking bays from three to two.

		In consultation with, and subsequently sanctioned by, the Fedco Finance and Budget Committee Portfolio-holders and the KUSA Legal Adviser, PM recommended to Fedco that, in order to avoid disruption to KUSA's services and operations at a critical stage, acceptance of the terms offered by AfricaWorks Group was preferable to a frantic search for alternative accommodation. Fedco accepted PM's recommendation and agreed to her renewing the lease with AfricaWorks Group from 1 October 2023 to 30 September 2024, with an option to renew for a further twelve (12) months. The Chairman called for ratification of Fedco's mandate given to PM and, on a proposal from RJ, seconded NdP, the mandate given to PM to sign the lease for the present office space occupied by KUSA, on the terms offered by AfricaWorks Group, was ratified, unanimously.

The Chairman informed Fedco that the brief and timelines related to a possible property acquisition by KUSA would be scheduled for discussion at the Fedco Discussion Forum in either January, or February 2024. Noted.
3.8		Protection of Personal Information Act (POPIA), No. 4 of 2013 (Fedco 12-2022 Item 3.8, Fedco 06-2023 Item 3.5) Progress report. The Chairman informed Fedco that the drafting of a document to establish a framework for KUSA's compliance with the POPIA was far advanced and should be completed by the end of June 2023. The framework requires a Privacy Policy to be put in place, part of which would be the drafting of a Privacy Notice for publication on the KUSA website. Considerable progress has been made with the drafting of the Notice, which still needed to be supplemented and edited by the KUSA Office prior to upload to the website. Discussion ensued on whether it was necessary for the KUSA-enabled structures, e.g. Provincial Councils, Breed Councils, Liaison Councils and Clubs, to comply with the provisions of the POPIA. The Chairman said that she could only be guided by the expert opinions KUSA had obtained at the time the POPIA came into effect, and Fedco's endorsement thereof. In the absence of a legitimate directive to the contrary, KUSA's formal sub-structures should be deemed obligated to comply with the POPIA. Noted.

		Motivation: At the Fedco Discussion Forum on 27 July 2023, the current dilemma of a number of affiliated Clubs being unable to meet their accumulated debt of accrued Penalty Fees was discussed extensively. It was noted that the situation had developed mainly because of the post-COVID economic woes, which had impacted on Clubs' ability to generate sufficient funds from their normal activities to meet their financial obligations.
		Fedco had been requested by Exco to consider instituting some form of interim relief for Clubs with regard to accumulated Pre- and Post-Show Penalty Fees by, at the very least, staying the imposition of further Penalty Fees and their accumulation during the period 1 September 2023 to 31 December 2023, with a view to allowing a future Penalty structure to be investigated and implemented. During the four-month "window" period contemplated above, payment of Penalty Fees already incurred would be deferred till 31 December 2023, and only commence accruing again with effect from 1 January 2024. Hopefully, during this four-month grace period, Clubs would be able to do the necessary fundraising to meet their accumulated Penalty debt.
		Although KUSA's Penalty Fees structure had been in place for some sixteen (16) years, factors such as reduced entries, exorbitant travel costs, Judge shortages and the difficulties experienced by Clubs to find people to serve on Committees, had gradually taken their toll on Clubs' finances, now compelling Fedco to take the remedial action proposed above. The "window" period would further allow Fedco the necessary time to prepare a formal proposal for future Pre- and Post-Show Penalties.

To change "dogsport" to "Dogsport" in Clause 4.1.6.

4.1.6. To observe, promote, support and uphold, in all its activities, the principles of KUSA and, in particular, to encourage the responsible breeding, registration and participation of dogs in conformation shows and their training for and participation in any other forms of D[d]ogsport.

Proposal & Motivation:

To amend Clause 4.1.18. to adjust Clause reference numbering.

4.1.18. To provide KUSA with financial statements, audited by the qualified auditor or Independent Financial Practitioner appointed in terms of Clause 16.1.<u>11[8].</u>, before 30 November of each year.

Proposal & Motivation:

To amend Clause 5.1.12. to provide for a declaration of Ineligible Member Clubs at **all** meetings, not just at Ordinary Meetings.

5.1.12. At any Ordinary Meeting, <u>Annual General Meeting or Special Meeting</u>, declare a Member Club to be an Ineligible Member Club if the Member Club is not properly constituted in terms of its own constitution, or the KUSA Constitution, thereby rendering it ineligible to be taken into account for Quorum Quantum calculation, or to participate in, or to vote at, that Ordinary Meeting, <u>Annual General Meeting</u> of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM].

Proposal & Motivation:

To amend Clause to change "Paragraph" to "Clause".

6.1. [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] shall be domiciled in the area designated in [Paragraph] Clause 2 of this Constitution and its address shall be that of the Secretary, for the time being, to which all official notices and communications of every kind shall be addressed and delivered.

Proposal & Motivation:

To insert a missing word "of" into Clause 11.3.

11.3. To retain their membership of, and representation on, [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM], Member Clubs shall at all times be properly constituted under their own constitutions and they shall notify [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] of their Officers (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer) within fourteen (14) days of their election, whether full-term, or part-term. Should the resignation of any Officers of a Member Club occur mid-term, such vacancy needs to be filled without delay and approved at the next Ordinary Meeting of the Member Club and [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] be informed of the replacements within the prescribed period.

Proposal & Motivation:

To expand Clause 12.1.3. to clarify the concept that a person may serve on the Council as Alternate for two Clubs.

12.1.3. An Alternate may act as Alternate for no more than two (2) Member Clubs on [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM], in other words, act as a "swing Alternate" for two (2) Member Clubs of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM], but may only act as Alternate for one (1) Member Club at any particular meeting of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM], and may not serve in any capacity on more than one (1) Provincial Council.

14.2. Standing Sub-Committees shall encourage, oversee and administer, within the KUSA area of jurisdiction, various branches of **D**[#]ogsport for which KUSA has established National Sub-Committees.

Proposal & Motivation:

To change "dogsport" to "Dogsport" in Clause 15.1.

15.1. Ad hoc Sub-Committees may be appointed from Members in Good Standing of KUSA who reside in the [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] area of jurisdiction and who are practitioners and/or administrators of the branch of **D**[d]ogsport to be served by the Ad hoc Sub-Committee. Terms of reference shall be laid down for all Ad hoc Sub-Committees and appended to this Constitution.

Proposal & Motivation:

To change "dogsport" to "Dogsport" in Clause 15.2.

15.2. Ad hoc Sub-Committees shall encourage and nurture, within the [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] area of jurisdiction and in collaboration with enthusiasts in other Provincial Councils, fledgling branches of **D**[d]ogsport with the purpose of developing them and increasing their popularity, in order to achieve National Sub-Committee status for them under KUSA.

Proposal & Motivation:

To insert a new Clause 16.1.2., followed by sequential renumbering, to provide a notice period for convening AGMs.

16.1.2. The Secretary shall give twenty-one (21) days' Notice, as contemplated in Clause 7 hereof, to convene the Annual General Meeting of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM].

Proposal & Motivation:

To insert new Clause 16.1.5.2., followed by sequential renumbering, to make it clear that the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Provincial Council shall either be the Chairman and Representative of a Member Club, or the Representative of a Standing Sub-Committee.

16.1.5.2. The Chairman and Vice-Chairman shall either be the Chairman of a

Member Club at the time of their election, or the elected Representative of
a Standing Sub-Committee, and shall hold either such office for the

16.1.5.3. 16.1.5.4. If, during the course of his term of office, the Chairman should become permanently unable to continue to act in the capacity of Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall become the Chairman for the unexpired term of office of the Chairman and the Members of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] shall, at the earliest Ordinary Meeting of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM], elect a replacement for the Vice-Chairman to serve out his unexpired term of office, subject to the requirements set forth in Clause 16.1.5.2.

Proposal & Motivation:

To expand Clause 16.1.10. to provide for the polling functionality of online meeting platforms.

16.1.10. [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] shall appoint one or more Scrutineers to tally and confirm closed ballots, or votes cast using the secure and secret polling functionality of any of the online meeting platforms.

Proposal & Motivation:

To expand Clause 16.2.1. to also provide for the members of the Provincial Councils' Executive to call for a Special meeting, not only 25% of the Members of the Council.

16.2.1. The Secretary shall give notice to convene a Special Meeting of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] upon receiving a written requisition on behalf of not less than twenty-five per centum (25%) of the unsuspended Members of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM], or at the written requisition of all four the Executive Members, specifying the business to be brought before such meeting.

Proposal & Motivation:

To expand Clause 16.3.1. to also provide for a notice period to convene an Ordinary Meeting of the Provincial Councils.

16.3.1. Upon twenty-one (21) days' Notice given by the Secretary in accordance with Clause 7 hereof for each of its Ordinary Meetings, [INSERT COUNCIL INITIALISM] shall hold no fewer than four (4) Ordinary Meetings in each year and shall meet not less than once every three (3) months, but may meet as often as Members of [INSERT PROVINCIAL COUNCIL INITIALISM] deem necessary, or convenient.

17.7. For any closed ballot at a virtual, or partially virtual meeting, the confidentiality of the vote shall be the responsibility of the Chairman, using either the secure and secret polling functionali[ties]y of any of the various online meeting platforms, or by conducting the vote by email ahead of the meeting, sent to [an] one or more independent Scrutineers. For a show of hands at a virtual meeting, the showing-of-hand-functionality of the particular virtual platform should suffice, with the Meeting H[h] ost tallying the votes. The Scrutineer(s) or the Meeting Host must report the result to the Chairman, who will announce the outcome. In a vote for a contested office, simply disclosing the result, rather than the number of votes or percentage of votes polled by each candidate, would be at the sole discretion of the Chairman.

	MATTERS RELATING TO THE FÉDÉRATION CYNOLOGIQUE INTERNATIONALE (FCI)
5.1	FCI General Assembly (Geneva, August 2023)
	Report-back.
	JH and MV briefly reported on the FCI General Assembly and thanked Fedco for the opportunity to have attended this extremely important meeting. The proceedings at the General Assembly focussed heavily on administrative issues, fortunately none of them contentious. Both KUSA delegates found the deliberations and debates at the meeting extremely stimulating and informative.
	The Minutes of the General Assembly were distributed to FCI members under Circular 34-2023 on 15 September 2023, and have since been posted on the FCI website. FCI Circular 34-2023 was forwarded to the members of Fedco by the KUSA Office with a request to revert with any queries by 30 October 2023. Since there had been no requests to provide clarity on any of the items, JH and MV assumed that the Minutes were sufficiently self-explanatory.
	JH reminded Fedco of the General Assembly's approval of two new non-mandatory Dogsport commissions, namely Truffle Searching and Hoopers . After discussion, it was concluded that Truffle Searching was unlikely to spark any interest in South Africa and was therefore merely for noting by Fedco, but that Hoopers ought to be investigated as a possible Dogsport under KUSA. NS informed Fedco that some dog-training schools in the Western Cape were already training dogs to compete in Hoopers and that a number of "fun events" had been held in that province. Certain Members of Fedco expressed an interest in learning more about this curiously-named Dogsport, which prompted CPA to share a video-link with the Council.
	CC advised that, since Hoopers was essentially a Dogsport that could be practised by, amongst others, retired or young Agility dogs, she would be prepared to investigate the level of interest within the Agility and Dog Jumping community. DS agreed to assist CC in her survey and NS shared the name of the person currently involved in Hoopers-training in the Western Cape.
	5.1

	The Council agreed that, should there be sufficient interest, Hoopers ought to be constituted as a stand-alone Dogsport. This would, however, depend on the level of enthusiasm and the willingness of people to become actively involved in forming a steering committee to drive the promotion of Hoopers in order to advance its ultimate acceptance as a Dogsport under KUSA.
	The outcome of the survey to be undertaken by CC and DS would be discussed at future Fedco Discussion Forums, as soon as the results became available.
	Noted, with thanks. Fedco commended JH and MV for promoting and safeguarding KUSA's interests at this important international forum concerned with all facets of cynology.
	[Note: Prior to the release of these Minutes, CC shared with Fedco the results of the survey, which had elicited 129 responses. 100 Respondents confirmed their interest in Hoopers and 28 Respondents confirmed their willingness to serve on a steering committee to drive the ultimate establishment of Hoopers as a Dogsport under KUSA.]

		Proposal: To make Federal Council the enabling body for the establishment of a Liaison Council, not the Executive Committee.
		Motivation: Article 20.2.1 grants the authority for the establishment of Liaison Councils to the Executive Committee. As a Standing Sub-Committee of the Federal Council, the Executive Committee acquires the majority of its powers from the Federal Council through delegation.
		Although not the enabling body, Article 20.2.2 makes Liaison Councils accountable to the <i>Federal Council</i> (not to the Executive Committee), which makes no sense if the Federal Council would not be responsible for the delegation of powers to the Liaison Council.

In view of the above, we need to take cognisance of the fact that the Executive Committee cannot delegate the powers acquired by delegation to another entity. In this regard, a key principle in constitutional and administrative law is relevant, i.e., "delegate potestas non potest delegar" (no delegated powers can be further delegated) or, as stated in another way, "delegatus delegare non potest" (one to whom power is delegated cannot himself further delegate that power).

In order to reflect the appropriate enabling body in the Constitutions of Liaison Councils (i.e. the Federal Council), it is necessary that the erroneous Article 20.2.1 be amended.

Insertions in **underlined bold type** and deletions in [struck through square brackets].

20.2 Liaison Councils

20.2.1 The <u>Federal Council</u> [Executive Committee] may establish a Liaison Council to serve any area of interest, which falls across the jurisdiction of more than one Provincial Council and, subject to its right to revoke such delegation at any time, may delegate all or any of its powers under this Constitution to such Liaison Council[, subject to confirmation by the Federal Council].

On a proposal from GR, seconded by NdP, the approval of the amendment of the Article 20.2.1 by Fedco round robin was ratified, unanimously.

Proposed amendment to Article 8.6.2 by insertion of a new, separated Article 8.6.3

Motivation:

To make it clear that Clubs that do not take the necessary urgent steps to fill vacancies on their Executives (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer), or to replace other constitutionally required Officials, such as an Information Officers or Deputy Information Officers (optional), when they occur, will be in breach of the KUSA Constitution and thereby ineligible to be granted Championship Show Licences. Moreover, for as long as the default persists, Clubs shall have their privilege of participating in their Provincial Councils' meetings suspended, together with their good standing in the Kennel Union. When Clubs are declared "Ineligible Member Clubs" for purposes of any Provincial Council Meeting in terms of any of the Provincial Councils' Constitutions, it should be beyond doubt that, at the time of such declaration, they have had their privilege of participation in their particular Provincial Council's meetings suspended and, in consequence, have placed their good standing with KUSA on hold. Mid-term appointments of Executive Members who have vacated their offices should be a swift and seamless process at an ordinary Committee meeting of the Club, or by Committee round robin.

Proposal:

Insertions in <u>underlined bold type</u> and deletions in [struck through square brackets].

8.6.2 details of every Annual General Meeting and any other Special General Meeting specifying the names of persons present and resolutions adopted, together with one copy of the annual audited accounts of income and expenditure and the Club's balance sheet shall be forwarded to the Federal Council. Minutes of Annual/Special General meetings shall be supplied within thirty (30) days of any such meeting and the copy of the audited accounts shall be supplied once in each calendar year.

SEPARATED FROM 8.6.2 ABOVE AND AMENDED AS ARTICLE 8.6.3: [The Club shall ensure that the] names and contact details of the Club's Officers (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer), and its appointed Officials, i.e. Information Officer and optional Deputy Information Officer[) names and contact details are sent to KUSA for recording] to be sent to KUSA each time there is a change and shall further ensure that the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, Information Officer and optional Deputy Information Officer, as well as any Committee Member with financial banking powers, i.e. with signing or transacting powers, in whatever form, on any of the Club's bank accounts, are members in good standing of the Kennel Union. At the same time of sending the names and contact details of Club Officers to KUSA, the Club shall also advise the names of the Club Committee members with signing or transacting powers, in whatever form, on any of the Club's bank accounts.

NEW ARTICLES 8.6.3.1 & 8.6.3.2:

8.6.3.1 Clubs are obliged to inform their Provincial Councils and the Kennel Union forthwith if, for whatever reason, any of their elected Officers or appointed Officials as per Article 8.6.3 should change mid-term, providing full particulars of replacements.
8.6.3.2 Should any of the Club's Officers (Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer) vacate their office, the Club's eligibility to be granted a Licence for a Championship Show and its privilege to participate in its Provincial Council's meetings shall be suspended until the replacement has been advised to the Kennel Union.

CURRENT 8.6.3, 8.6.4 & 8.6.5 TO BE RENUMBERED 8.6.4, 8.6.5 & 8.6.6.

Proposed amendments to Article 9

Motivation:

To make it clear that Clubs that fail to adhere to their Club Constitutions (Article 9.1.2), or fail to submit their AGM documentation within thirty (30) days of their AGM (Article 9.1.3), or fail to submit the required returns in respect of Shows or Events held (Article 9.1.4), would be in breach of the KUSA Constitution and therefore ineligible to be granted Championship Show Licences. Moreover, to make it clear that, should any of these defaults persist up to the KUSA Financial Year-end of 31 August, Clubs' privilege of participating in their Provincial Councils' meetings would be placed under suspension, together with their good standing in the Kennel Union, for as long as the default persists. When a Club is declared an "Ineligible Member Club" for purposes of its Provincial Council Meeting in terms of the relevant Provincial Council Constitution, it should be beyond doubt that, at the time of such declaration, the Club has had its privilege to participate in its Provincial Council's meetings suspended and, in consequence, has placed its good standing with KUSA on hold.

9. LOSS OF AFFILIATION AND OTHER PUNITIVE MEASURES

NEW 9.3: Should a Club find itself in default as a result of any of the transgressions cited under Articles 9.1.2 to 9.1.4 above, it shall be ineligible to be granted a Licence for a Championship Show. If still in default by 31 August of any year, it will be suspended from the privilege of participating in any meeting of its Provincial Council, irrespective of whether its affiliation had been renewed by 31 October in terms of Article 9.2, until the default is remedied or, if it remains unremedied, till the next constituted Ordinary Meeting of the Federal Council where the Club will be tabled for disaffiliation. At such Ordinary Meeting, the Federal Council shall take account of any actions the Club in question had taken during the preceding default period to remedy whatever breaches had occurred and take such decisions as deemed appropriate at the time.

			DSC Findings: After careful consideration of all the submitted evidence, documents and affidavits, the DSC unanimously reached the following decision, on a balance of probabilities, with regard to the case before them:

Breed Health – BOAS (Fedco 12-2019 Item 9.8, Fedco 06.2020 Item 8.3, Fedco 12-2021 Item 4.3.3, Fedco 06-2022 Item 8.1, Fedco, Fedco 06-2023 Item 9.1)

LT reported to Fedco as follows:

"The first phase of the project to introduce BOAS testing in South Africa commenced with an informative webinar on 22 March 2023. Invitations to attend the webinar, **BOAS Testing in French Bulldogs**, were sent out from the KUSA Office to 220 breeders who had registered French Bulldogs in the recent past. Sadly, only 16 attended the webinar – an extremely poor response, given the breed health challenges facing breeders worldwide.

During the webinar, the delegates were offered access to a recording of a global webinar, **The Science and Solution behind BOAS**, presented by Dr Jane Ladlow in March 2023. No requests were received to view this very informative presentation.

All the invitees were offered a recording of the KUSA webinar, with only 2 requests received post the event.

During the discussion segment of the KUSA webinar, those attending were urged to step up and join a Task Group to move forward with the required actions to implement BOAS testing in South Africa. Sadly, only 2 people volunteered, both of whom had already been collaborating actively towards the implementation of BOAS testing.

My appeal to Fedco would be to move forward with a different approach and make contact with Onderstepoort and Cambridge University. In this way, BOAS testing can be introduced to South Africa, making the uptake the responsibility of the individual breeders. Needless to say, a campaign to encourage testing through the various Clubs would form part of the promotion campaign."

It was proposed by CI, seconded by RJ, and agreed, unanimously, to accept LT's proposed next steps.

Report-back by PM at the September Fedco Discussion Forum:

PM reported that, on 5 September 2023, she engaged Prof Johan Schoeman in an exploratory discussion, which TL was unfortunately unable to attend. Prof Schoeman is professor of Small Animal Internal Medicine at the Pretoria University's Faculty of Veterinary Science at Onderstepoort. He's the leader of the Faculty's pathobiology research team and deemed his current field of study and interests to be in synergy with BOAS, in particular the Respiratory Function Grading System being proposed. Although Prof Schoeman admitted knowing little about KUSA, he seemed extremely keen on a potential partnership with KUSA and the benefits likely to be reaped therefrom. Having superficially been briefed on the functions, affiliations and

aspirations of KUSA, he expressed the opinion that veterinary practitioners ought to be better informed about KUSA and the important role it played in canine-related affairs.

Prof Schoeman was also involved with the European College of Veterinary Internal Medicine (ECVIM) Examination Board and travelled to Europe twice a year, in March and September. Should training be required to set up the Respiratory Grading System, it might be possible to piggyback on to his trips overseas. Although he had previously lectured at the University of Cambridge in the UK, he was not familiar with work of Dr Jane Ladlow. He requested that information on BOAS and the Respiratory Grading Scheme be forwarded to him, after which he would provide comment and his view on a possible way forward.

Fedco thanked PM for her feedback.

The Chairman reported that she had scheduled a meeting with the Fedco Task Team – JH, PM, NdP & GR – for 05.07.2023, the outcome of which would be tabled at the next Fedco Discussion Forum following this Ordinary Meeting.

Report-back from the appointed Fedco Task Team:

At its meeting of 5 July 2023, the Fedco Task Team was briefed by PM and JH on a preliminary meeting held earlier in the year with Dr Sheryl van Staden, Chief Scrutineer of the SAVA-KUSA HD & ED Scheme ("the Scheme"). At the July & August 2023 Fedco Discussion Forums, the Task Team members were thanked for their endeavours and it was agreed that the following should be addressed with the stakeholders involved in the breeds with HD- & ED-related breed-specific registration requirements as listed in Schedule 02 Appendix "C" & Appendix "E":

The relevant stakeholders should be urged to consider, *inter alia*:

- The implementation of the changes to the Scheme identified by the Task Team for those breeds listed in Schedule 02 Appendix C to determine their suitability for breeding.
- Members' preference as to whether their dogs' HD & ED grades should appear as a
 suffix to the dog's Registered Name on the KUSA Certificate of Registration, or recorded
 on the Annex to the Certificate of Registration (Health Certificate), or on both, or on
 neither of these Certificates. [Note: In the latter case, the HD & ED grades would be
 recorded on a dog's profile on the KUSA database to enable KUSA to determine
 breeding suitability, but not be reflected on the Certificates.]
- For breeds not listed on Schedule 02 Appendix C, Members' option to submit x-rays for evaluation to internationally recognised institutions endorsed by KUSA. [Note: With regard to breeds not listed on Schedule 02 Appendix C, it should be noted that KUSA will not convert HD or ED grades that are not aligned with the FCI grading system. Non-FCI-aligned grading scores may be recorded as a suffix to the registered name on the KUSA Certificate of Registration, or on the Annex to the Certificate of Registration (Health Certificate), or on both, e.g. The Royal Kennel Club BVA; United States of

America – PENN HIPS; Australian National Kennel Council – CHEDS (Canine Hip and Elbow Dysplasia Scheme)] The Task Team recognised that the current Appeals Procedure of the Scheme was in urgent need of revision to meet Members' expectations. NdP expressed the view that a clear distinction needed to be made between a **review** and an **appeal**. A **review** was to check whether a decision made on evidence presented was, in fact, a correct and lawful decision and that the correct procedures had been followed. An appeal, on the other hand, might involve the submission of fresh evidence, or additional information, to the Appeals Authority with a view to persuading the Authority to assess the evidence ab initio, obviously in the hope of overturning the previous decision for a more favourable outcome. In view of this, it was recommended that the following concessions be included in the Appeals Procedure: Allowance ought to be made for Members to submit a different, or more recent, set of xrays, in other words, they should not be bound by the initial set of x-rays submitted, which had vielded the inceptive adverse result. Allowance needed to be made for Members, for purposes of Appeals adjudication, to elicit the opinion of an FCI-recognised "Appeal Radiologist" on the original x-rays. Whether the submission of a fresh set of x-rays to an Appeal Radiologist would be permissible, was still to be considered. A proposal mooting the envisioned reforms was in preparation. Once drafted, the proposal would be submitted for scrutiny by Breed Councils, Liaison Councils and Specialist Breed Clubs. Should one or more of the breeds listed in Schedule 02 Appendix "C" and Appendix "E" not be represented by any of these constituted structures, the views of breeder Members would be solicited. Once the input of all relevant stakeholders had been considered, the information would be consolidated in a proposal for the consideration of all concerned. Post acceptance, the following actions were anticipated by the Task Team: To meet with Dr Sheryl van Staden to officially inform the SAVA of the proposed revisions to the Scheme KUSA intended adopting; and To keep Fedco informed of negotiations with the SAVA to effect the proposed amendments to the Scheme. 10.2 Proposed amendments to Schedules 03, 04 & 07 to provide for a revised structure for Preand Post-Show Penalty Fees, envisaged to be implemented as from 1 January 2024

Submitted by the Executive Committee.

Background:

At the Fedco Discussion Forum on 27 July 2023, the current dilemma of a number of affiliated Clubs being unable to meet their accumulated debt of accrued Penalty Fees was discussed extensively. It was **noted** that the situation had developed mainly because of the post-COVID economic woes, which have impacted on Clubs' ability to generate sufficient funds from their normal activities to meet their financial obligations.

Subsequently, the Federal Council agreed, at a Special Meeting on 14 September 2023, to institute an interim emergency measure for the period 1 September to 31 December 2023 and issued a formal Fedco Directive to be sent to affected Clubs. This emergency measure was envisaged to grant affected Clubs interim short-term relief by extending the payment term for accrued Penalty Fees and stay the imposition of new Penalty Fees during the above-mentioned "window" period. This "window" period was also anticipated to afford Fedco sufficient time to prepare a formal proposal to revise the future Pre- and Post-Show Penalty Fee structure for the Agenda of Fedco 12-2023 which, if accepted, would come into effect on 1 January 2024.

After careful consideration, and in consultation with the KUSA Office, the following proposal had been prepared:

Proposal:

To revise the Pre- and Post-Show Penalty Fees structure and adjust it to more manageable levels, given the current economic constraints and financial hardship experienced by Clubs.

Motivations:

Pre-Show Penalty Fees Draft Show Schedules

Schedule 03 Regulation 2 states that Clubs' draft Show Schedules must be completed and submitted to KUSA six (6) months prior to a Show. It is proposed that, instead of imposing Penalty Fees for every omission from the Show Schedule as enumerated under Schedule 03, the Penalty Fees should be imposed on the Show Schedule as a whole, inclusive of elements such as Judges' "Letters of Acceptance", in other words, individual outstanding elements should not be penalised over and above the Schedule as a whole. **Licence Fees** not paid prior to six (6) months before the Show were *not* envisaged to be exempted from attracting Penalty Fees. The proposed alterations to Schedule 03 are as stated below.

Post-Show Penalty Fees

Show Documentation and Show Levies

No amendments are proposed to change Schedule 03 Regulations 6 & 10, which impose the submission of Show Documentation and Show Levies. The quantum of Post-Show Penalty Fees has been reviewed and adjusted and is reflected under Proposal 3, dealing with amendments to Schedule 07. It is important for Post-Show Penalty Fees to remain in place, albeit at a reduced level, to encourage adherence to Regulations 6 and 10 and the submission of Show Documentation and Show Levies to the KUSA Office within fifteen (15) working days to enable the finalisation and closure of the Show without undue delay.

Proposal 1:

Proposed amendments to Schedule 03 Regulations 5.16 and 5.17

Insertions in <u>underlined bold type</u> and deletions in [struck through square brackets].

- 5.16 Where Draft Schedules submitted by Clubs in terms of Regulation 2 and Regulation 5 of this Schedule are:
 - 5.16.1 received [in] by the KUSA [e]Office later than six (6) months before the first day of the show, [and/or] for any reason whatsoever, such Clubs shall pay Penalty Fees as specified for:
 - [5.16.2 where letters of acceptance from all the proposed Judges are not included, and/or]
 - [5.16.3 where letters of acceptance received are for persons who are not qualified to judge the breeds/groups/events for which they contract themselves, such clubs shall pay a penalty as specified for:]
 - 5.16[.4].2 each week or part thereof [that] the Draft Schedule is received late, and/or [5.16.5 each Judge whose letter of acceptance is not enclosed with the Draft Schedule, and/or]
 - 5.16[\pm].3 each Judge who is not qualified to judge the \pm Breeds/ \pm Croups/ \pm Croup
- 5.17 Where a Club, for any reason whatsoever, has been unable to finalise its Draft Schedule twelve (12) weeks before the first day of the Show, no licence shall be issued for that event. If a licence has already been issued and paid for, Licence Fees will be refunded to the Club, subject to the deduction of Penalty Fees incurred up to twelve (12) weeks and, should the Penalty Fees be in excess of the Licence Fees, the Club shall be responsible for payment of the shortfall.

[**Note:** Schedule 07 is also governed by Schedule 03 Regulations 6 and 10. No changes are proposed to be made to these Regulations, which are shaded below for ease of reference only.]

6. SHOW SCHEDULE

No Show Schedule shall be issued to the public before being approved by the Executive Committee after submission in terms of Regulation 2, and within twenty-four (24) hours of issue to the public, a copy of the Show Schedules as so issued shall be dispatched to the Secretary.

- 6.1 The Schedule shall be treated as a contract between the Show Authorities and the Exhibitors. Once approved by the Executive Committee no modification or amendment of any description may be made to the Show Schedule unless special dispensation is granted.
- 6.2 Any Club which fails to submit a Show Schedule in terms of Regulation 6 of this Schedule, shall pay a penalty as specified in terms of Subscription & Fees (Schedule 07).

10. SHOW CATALOGUE

- 10.3 One (1) copy of the catalogue containing accurate details of all show entries and all awards made, signed, and certified as correct by the Show Secretary shall be despatched to the Secretary within fifteen (15) working days after the close of the Show.
- 10.4 Any Club which fails to submit a catalogue in terms of Regulation 10.3 of this Schedule such Club shall pay a penalty as specified in terms of Schedule 07 for each week or part of a week thereof that such catalogue is not received.

It is proposed that Schedule 05B(02) Regulation 2.8 be amended as indicated below:

Motivation:

The International Utility Dog Regulations (IGP), governed by the FCI, does not contain a stipulation as embodied in Regulation 2.8. FCI-IGP Sport in South Africa should be in sync with the International Regulations.

Proposed amendments to Schedule 05B(02) – Regulations for International Working Dog

In the various Tracking Trials that are available through FCI-IGP, the qualifications obtained by dogs tracking "a stranger's track" are usually governed by a draw system which is designed to keep the Tracklayer from knowing whose track he/she might be laying. As such, the Tracklayer would not be afforded the opportunity to alter the track laid in favour of, or against, a competitor. The FCI-IGP Sport in South Africa is a small community and limiting the potential Tracklayers available for selection, especially in larger competitions, is detrimental to the continued success and growth of the sport.

The changes proposed below, if approved, are proposed to be made to the following sections of Schedule 05B(02):

[Note: NdP, in his capacity as Chairman of the NAPC, informed Fedco that he was unaware of the NAPC IGP Sub-Committee's submission of Proposal 1.]

The Fedco-portfolio holder for IGP, DS, was requested by Fedco to contact Mr John Swartz, Convener of the National IGP Sub-Committee and Chairman of the NAPC IGP Sub-Committee, to confirm the passage of the above Proposal through the NIGPSC. Mr Swartz responded during the telephone call that, since the proposed changes were, in fact, changes to the regulations of the FCI, he didn't see any need for them to be passed through the NIGPSC.

Mr Swartz's view was reported to Fedco, upon which discussion ensued as to whether Fedco was at liberty to make a decision on proposed changes to KUSA's Schedule 05B(02), which had not been formally sanctioned by the NIGPSC. The general view was that, although the changes might well have been FCI-prompted, proper procedure needed to be followed. Whether a formality, or not, it was essential to secure the clearance from the NIGPSC for any of the changes to filter down into the KUSA Schedule 05B(02). In the absence of Minutes of a meeting of the NIGPSC, reflecting the corroboration of the decision taken by the members of the NIGPSC by majority vote to amend Schedule 05B(02), Fedco had no choice but to **defer** its decision on the approval of the Proposal 1, pending receipt of Minutes verifying the NIGPSC's decision.

On a proposal by DS, seconded by CC, and agreed unanimously, a decision on Proposal 1 as submitted by the NAPC IGP Sub-Committee, was deferred, pending receipt of Minutes corroborating a decision taken at NIGPSC level to proceed with the amendments to Schedule 05B(02).

Submitted by the KUSA Office as a consequence of its preparation of the proposed changes to Schedule 05B(02) contained in **deferred** Proposal 1.

In addition, our Judges are watching dogs and handlers whilst walking and so are not watching the land surfaces for pitfalls. As such, they are in even more danger of falling on uneven land surfaces.
		To safeguard the health and mobility of our Judges, we request that the clause be amended to allow for Judges to use appropriate mechanical or physical aids (such as leaning on a tracking pole/shepherd's staff, or stick, while walking behind a competitor), should they believe that such aids would be conducive to their mobility during the various exercises.

The majority of disciplines were successful in holding successful Field Trials and Tests across the country. On the upside, a total of 393 dogs ran in Retirever Trials, 49 in Spaniel Trials, 5 dogs ran in the Natural Ability Test, 34 in HPR Trials, 30 in Shooting Ratings, 15 in Versatile Hunting Tests (Pointing Breeds) and 19 in Gundog Hunting Tests. A number of Retriever Clubs and Versatile Breed Clubs also managed to hold Working Tests and workshops during the season, which enabled dogs to get some extra training and Trial experience. The FTLC has continued to focus on improving judging skills in all disciplines and on trying to attract new judges to the sport. To this extent, five new candidates registered for judging exams this year and four Judging/Test Seminars were held by the various disciplines and were attended by large numbers of Judges and participants. 1. Versatile Hunting Dogs Test Seminar These were all sponsored by the FTLC and were extremely successful. 9.1.2.4The Test must be conducted by three (3) Judges, two (2) of whom will be on the A or B Panel of Judges for HPR Field Trials (HPR) Schedule 05C(3), Shooting Ratings (SR) Schedule 05C(4), Gundog Hunting Tests (GHT) Schedule 05C(5), or Versatile Tests – Pointing Dogs (VT) Schedule 05C(6) and one (1) of whom will be on the KUSA Gundog Group Panel or on the panel for the breed(s) being tested. The Club will appoint a Senior Judge, who must be on the A or B Panel of Judges for HPR, ST, GHT or VT. The HPR, SR, GHT or VT Judges will be responsible for evaluating the Obedience and Fieldwork Sections of the Test. Should there be a difference of opinion between these two Judges, the Senior Judge's opinion will prevail. [will have the casting vote.]The conformation Judge will only be responsible for the conformation evaluation.

9.1.4 The Natural Ability Certificate and Title

- 9.1.4.2Upon successful completion of the Test, the owner will be issued an official KUSA Natural Ability Certificate by the <code>[e]C</code>lub holding the <code>T[t]</code>est. The Certificate will state the owner's name, the dog's registered name and registration number, registered names and registration numbers of the dog's sire and dam, the breed of dog, and that the dog has been tested as an all-purpose, versatile hunting dog complying with the minimum standards and natural abilities of an HPR breed (refer <code>[8.1.7.1]9.3</code> SPECIMEN NATURAL ABILITY CERTIFICATE). The Certificate shall be signed by all Judges and by the Secretary of the Club holding the <code>T[t]</code>est. (Clubs may, at their discretion, issue an informal <code>[e]C]</code>lub certificate to a dog <code>[which]</code> <code>that</code> passes the Obedience, <code>Field_</code> and Waterwork <code>[s]Sections</code>, but <code>[which]</code> <code>that</code> fails the Conformation <code>[t]Test</code>. This certificate must be clearly marked to indicate that the dog is not recommended for breeding and that the dog is not qualified to carry the NA title).

		During the past year, the NAgSC members have been kept very busy attending to several key initiatives. The bulk of these initiatives were necessary to align and update our KUSA Schedules with the recent FCI changes. The major activities undertaken during this last year include the following:
		 Voting towards FCI Agility Rule changes; and Updating of the KUSA Schedule 05L and relevant Appendices.

In addition, we successfully handled the regular annual events, including:

- SAAC Finals 2022;
- National Agility League 2022; and
- SAAC Trials 2023.

I wish to thank the entire NAgSC for their efforts, as well as the KUSA Office support team for their assistance.

FCI Agility Rule Changes:

The FCI Agility Commission undertakes an exercise of updating its rules once every 5 years. There were some notable changes this time around, namely the addition of new Intermediate height category (previous incorporated into the Large height category) and the removal of the upcontact judging criteria on the Dog Walk and the A-Frame, being the most significant.

KUSA Schedule 05L and appendices changes:

The NAgSC spent significant time ensuring that the relevant parts of Schedule 05L were updated to be aligned with the FCI rule changes, as well as updating the Schedule 05L to improve readability, improve the nomenclature and standardisation of terminology.

SAAC Finals 2022:

The KZN Agility Sub-Committee hosted SAAC 2022 and the event was a significant success. The event attracted competitors from around the country and a Kelpie won the Large height category for the first time. I would like to thank Bev and her team for organising and hosting the event.

Nutribyte renewed their sponsorship of the event for 2022, which was greatly appreciated. A small team (eventually 2 handler-and-dog teams) were selected to represent KUSA and the FCI AWC 2022 in Austria.

National Agility League 2022:

The National Agility League for 2022 was very successful, with a total of R20 200.00 being raised as Entry Fees. This is the highest amount recorded in the last 4 years. The top 5 dogs received automatic qualifications towards SAAC 2023, and dog brush prizes sponsored by Pet Teezer.

SAAC Trials 2023:

A significant number of dogs entered the SAAC Trials for 2023, with Entry Fees increasing by over 15% versus 2022. A new format of selection for the SAAC Finals is being used from 2023, which eliminates the previous concerns of reserves and waiting lists.

This appears to have been widely accepted, and appreciated by all handlers. Everyone is looking forward to the DOGSPC Agility Sub-Committee hosting the event again in June 2023. Nutribyte have again renewed their title sponsorship for the event.

		The National Rally Dog Sub-Committee has had a year of setting and achieving goals, across SA, as has each province that makes up the NRDSC.
		We continue to grow our Dogsport beautifully in all provinces and have added to the pool of Judges in most provinces, holding Judges' Workshops and preparing Aspirant Judges for the exams to be written, and then also assisting those who require shadow appointments so they may feel confident to step into the ring to judge.
		All provinces have been issuing Record Cards and, although I do not have a total from each province, I am informed that all provinces have grown Rally Dog.
		Rally Dog was included for the first time in the KUSA Nationals 2023 held in Gauteng. The result was an unbelievable tie for 1st place between WC's Sylia Stringer & Danny and KZN's Maxine Quinton & Kendo, these two dogs achieving the exact same score within the exact same time, with Sylvia's dog, Lizzie, taking 3rd place. We are proud of all the handlers and their dogs.
		We had an interesting year in terms of FCI, where Mr Martinus van der Vyver resigned as FCI Representative for South Africa and Mrs Chantal Ross-Germishuys was unanimously elected as FCI Representative. Chantal updates us with the following:

whether or not they are using <u>a lure</u> [feed]. If the test is performed live, the <u>E</u>valuator must ensure that the handlers use food judiciously, showing due consideration for other handlers undertaking testing at the time.

11.2 BEGINNER TRICK DOG

Number of **Evaluators required**: One (1)

Eligibility: Dogs must be at least six (6) months old to take part in the test. Dogs must be microchipped. Handler/owner <u>does not have to be a member of KUSA</u> and <u>the</u> dog do<u>es</u> not have to be registered with KUSA. Dogs must have passed either Elementary Trick Dog or Canine Good Citizen Bronze to participate in this level.

Number of tricks required: Fifteen (15) tricks from at least ten (10) different categories.

Use of food and lures: [Handlers may have food on them provided it is in a pocket or treat bag and may reward their dog after each trick is performed.] The handler may have food on his person You may have food on your body (which includes treat-bags and/or pockets). Handlers may reward their dog after each trick is performed. Luring with toys or food will be allowed in the execution of seven (7) [five (5)] of the fifteen (15) tricks and handlers must indicate whether or not they are using a lure [food]. If the test is performed live, the Evaluator must ensure that the handlers use food judiciously, showing due consideration for other handlers undertaking testing at the time.

11.3 NOVICE TRICK DOG

Number of Evaluators required: One (1)

Eligibility: Dogs must have passed Beginners Trick Dog. Dogs must be microchipped. Handler/owner <u>does not have to be a member of KUSA</u> and <u>the</u> dog do<u>es</u> not have to be registered with KUSA.

Number of tricks required: Fifteen (15) tricks from at least ten (10) different categories.

Use of food and lures: [Handlers may have food on them provided it is in a pocket or treat bag and may reward their dog after each trick is performed.] The handler may have food on his person You may have food on your body (which includes treat-bags and/or pockets).

Handlers may reward their dog after each trick is performed. [Can have food in hand but not for luring.] Luring will be allowed in five (5) [seven (7)] of the fifteen (15) tricks. [Food lures may not be used.] If the test is performed live, the Evaluator must ensure that the handlers use food judiciously, showing due consideration for other handlers undertaking testing at the time.

11.4 INTERMEDIATE TRICK DOG

Number of **Evaluators required**: One (1)

Eligibility: Dogs must have passed Novice Trick Dog. Dogs must be microchipped. Handler/owner does not have to be a member of KUSA and the dog does not have to be registered with KUSA.

Number of tricks required: Fifteen (15) tricks from at least ten (10) different categories.

Use of food and lures: [Handlers may have food on them provided it is in a pocket or treat bag and may reward their dog after each trick is performed.] The handler may have food on his person (which includes treat-bags and/or pockets) but not in your hands or mouth. 		The Chairman of the JEC, Clr BG Robinson, reported on the activities of the JEC since Fedco 06-2023 and highlighted the progress and achievements of Learner Judges on the KUSA Breed Judges' Learning Programme during this period. He reflected on the quality of the webinars the JEC had been able to present to Learners, in the majority of cases featuring Breed Specialist from all over the world as presenters.
		Clr Robinson drew the attention of Fedco to the duly motivated changes in the structure of the JEC, covered in detail in the Agenda and due to be expanded in the Minutes. He also set out his vision for the JEC going forward, following Fedco's decision to restore the JEC's core administrative functions to the KUSA Judges' Department, where they more appropriately belong.

	Clr Robinson thanked all those who had given so liberally of their time and expertise to ensure that the JEC remained faithful to its mission to "deliver skills-ready Judges capable of acquitting themselves exceptionally well in the global fields of conformation and Dogsport judging."
	In closing, CIr Robinson appealed to the Provincial Council Chairmen to play a meaningful role in Judges' Education in their Provinces, which would require their acquainting themselves with the Regulations governing the KUSA Breed Judges' Learning Programme in order to assist Learners in need of advice, or guidance.
	Fedco thanked the Chairman of the JEC for his leadership and his creative approach to problem-solving and accepted the report by acclamation.

	Acceptance of proposed amendments to the JEC Constitution are at the sole and exclusive discretion of the Federal Council and are for noting by all other parties.]
15.	2.1 Ratification of Fedco round robin – Changes to the JEC Constitution and Schedules (Fedco round robin 12 November 2023)
	Submitted by the Chairman of the JEC, followed by a Fedco round robin on 12 November 2023 requested by the Chairman of the Federal Council, on behalf of the Acting Secretary.
	Proposal: To amend the JEC Constitution and to amend the positions and Key Functions of the members of the JEC as recorded on Annexure "B" to the JEC Constitution. Additionally, to amend the JEC Schedules to accord with the changes to Annexure "B".
	Background and Motivation: In line with Fedco's decision to recruit extra staff on a fixed-term or limited duration contract basis, to address staff- and skills-shortages in certain departments of the KUSA Office, it was concluded at Fedco 06-2023 that it had become necessary to restore to the KUSA Office the Administrative functions of the JEC which, since the inception of the Council, had been outsourced to the JEC due to the limited staff resources at the time.
	In September 2023, Mrs Audrey Hauptfleisch (Gauteng) was engaged on a limited duration part- time employment basis to act as the JEC Administrative and Judges' Approval Procurement Officer. The appointment of Mrs Hauptfleisch (Gauteng) was envisaged to relieve the administrative burden on Mrs Nadine Shortland, Shows' and Judges' Administrator.
	Following the distribution of the Agenda of Fedco 12-2023, certain additional developments occurred, or were brought to the attention of the JEC representatives on Fedco, which compelled more extensive amendments to particularly Annexure "B" of JEC Constitution and the following JEC Schedules :
	 Schedule 10 Appendix 1 – Group Course Schedule 10 Appendix 2 – Junior Showmanship Course

- Schedule 10 Appendix 3 Breed Specialisation Course
- Schedule 10 KUSA Breed Judges' Learning Programme

The recent developments, which compelled additional amendments were, in essence, the following:

- The JEC Representatives on Fedco were reminded by the KUSA Office that, in her email dated 5 January 2023, Dr Heidi Rolfes had advised the JEC Resources Team of her withdrawal from all JEC-related webinar activities and, more importantly, that, due to mounting work pressures, she would not be able to continue as Interim Support Officer beyond 2023. In that stand-in capacity, Dr Rolfes had essentially been responsible for the signing off of Learner Judges' Portfolios prior to their enrolment for any Paper 2 of the KUSA Breed Judges' examinations. In her email of 5 January 2023, she stated that: "I am only able to fulfil my job to mark the Portfolios in 2023." Dr Rolfes's withdrawal from the position of Interim Support Officer post 2023 was acknowledged by JH, JEC Representative on Fedco, on behalf of the JEC, with grateful thanks to Dr Rolfes for her preparedness to serve out the current year.
- Ms Joy McFarlane advised her retirement, effective 1 January 2024, from the JEC due to
 pressures to deliver on remunerated freelance work in an email dated 28 October 2023,
 but indicated that she would be available to accept commissions from KUSA should her
 professional services be required and her schedule permitted the acceptance of KUSAcommissions. GR, Chairman of the JEC, accepted Ms McFarlane's "retirement" as a
 member of the JEC on 7 November 2023.
- Mrs Sally Young has indicated her willingness to accept an invitation to join the JEC as
 its Resources Officer, having caretaken the position for a period of two years, assisted by
 Ms Michelle Tregoning and JH. Her formal appointment was subject to Fedco's approval.

The JEC Representatives on Fedco have spent an inordinate amount of time on a restructuring plan for the JEC, compelled by the foreseen and unforeseen developments mentioned above. The proposed plan has been discussed with the General Manager which, in principle, was accepted on behalf of the KUSA Office. In consequence, the JEC Representatives on Fedco appealed to Fedco to consider the necessary amendment of the **JEC Constitution as per Item 15.2.2**, the consolidated amendments to the **JEC Constitution Annexure "B" as per Item 15.2.3**, and the amendments to the respective **JEC Schedules as per Items 15.3.1 to 15.3.4**.

In its unanimous acceptance of the proposed amendments to the JEC Constitution, the JEC Constitution Annexure "B", and the respective JEC Schedules, by Fedco round robin circulated on 12 November 2023, Fedco issued the following Directive to the KUSA Office with regard to the reassignment of the JEC's functions and its administrative structure going forward:

- That the JEC Constitution be amended as proposed.
- That Annexure "B" to the JEC Constitution be amended as proposed and that the
 administrative functions of the JEC, now re-assigned to the KUSA Judges Department,
 be contained within Annexure "B" under an appropriate heading.
- That Schedule 10 Appendix 1 (Group Course), Schedule 10 Appendix 2 (Junior Showmanship Course), Schedule 10 Appendix 3 (Breed Specialisation Course) and Schedule 10 (KUSA Breed Judges' Learning Programme) be amended as proposed.
- That the sign-off of Learners' Portfolios which, essentially, involves the checking of documentation in order to verify that all the course requirements had been met by the

Learner in order to enrol for Paper 2 of the various Groups, Breed Specialisation or Junior Showmanship, should be assigned to the KUSA Judges' Department to be assessed by a person with suitable experience as regulated in the appropriate Schedule, with two secondary functions of the Support Officer assigned to the JEC Vice-Chairman and co-representative of the JEC on Fedco.

[Note: The above would render the functions of the Support Officer on the JEC, as currently contemplated in Annexure "B", fully re-assigned and make the Support Officer, as initially conceived when the JEC was constituted, a redundant position.]

- That the setting and marking of examination papers should be outsourced by the General Manager of KUSA to a suitably qualified person, in consultation with the JEC's two Fedco Representatives and in liaison with the KUSA Judges' Department.
- That commissions relating to curriculum development and updating of existing study
 materials should be outsourced by the General Manager of KUSA to a suitably qualified
 person, in consultation with the JEC's two Fedco Representatives and in liaison with the
 KUSA Judges' Department.
- That the preparation and presentation of mandatory seminars and workshops for Learner
 Judges, whether virtual or face-to-face, should be outsourced by the General Manager of
 KUSA to a suitably qualified person, in consultation with the JEC's two Fedco
 Representatives and in liaison with the KUSA Judges' Department.
- That Mrs Sally Young must be invited and, if agreeable, be appointed as Resources
 Officer of the JEC with effect from 1 January 2024, assisted by the Vice-Chairman of the
 JEC and other persons appointed to the Resources Team to fulfil certain technical and
 administrative functions.
- That a fresh Annexure "B" to the JEC Constitution, incorporating the extensive changes, must be prepared in consultation with the JEC's two Fedco Representatives and be appended to the amended JEC Constitution (refer to Item 15.2.2) for signature by the Chairman of the Federal Council.

For ratification.

On a proposal by GR, seconded by MV, the approval by Fedco of all amendments to the JEC Constitution and the relevant Schedules, culminating in the Directive issued by Fedco to the KUSA Office, were ratified, unanimously.

In the ever-changing landscape of Judges' Education, the JEC needs to be able to be agile in its responses and not be constitutionally constrained by provisions which are no longer appropriate. The Members of the JEC shall be appointed by the Federal Council on the recommendation of its two (2) Federal Council Representatives (refer to clause **7.3)**, and serve at the sole discretion of the Federal Council. 7.2. The Federal Council shall have the right to terminate the appointment of any Member at any time with immediate effect. 7.3. The Members of the JEC shall comprise [no fewer than five (5) persons and no more than seven (7). Ithe number of persons required to execute its various function at any given time, inclusive of the two (2) Federal Council Representatives, designated appointed Chairman of the JEC and Vice-Chairman of the JEC respectively, the balance of whom to act in positions styled and approved by the Federal Council from time to time, fulfilling the key functions associated with those positions as determined by the Federal Council and appended as Annexure "B" hereto. 7.4. If deemed advisable by the Federal Council, one Member may hold two or more positions on the JEC and fulfil the functions assigned to those positions in tandem. 7.5. The appointment of Members shall be for two (2) calendar years and, during any twoyear term, the Federal Councils shall be at liberty to appoint further Members fup to the -maximum quota. For replace Members who have resigned, or whose appointments have been terminated by the Federal Council. 7.6. 15.3.5 Ratification of Fedco round robin – Dispensation request from the Rottweiler Working & Breeding Association (RWBA) to hold its Championship Show on the JEC November 2023 Examination date. (Fedco round robin 12 September 2023)

Proposal:

The JEC requests ratification by the Federal Council of a request submitted to the JEC from the Chairman of the Rottweiler Breed Council, Mr Neil Perkins, on behalf of the RWBA, to grant the RWBA a once-off dispensation to hold its Championship Show in 2023 on 11 November 2023, the same date allocated for the November 2023 JEC examinations.

Motivation:

The Rottweiler Working and Breeding Association (RWBA) had been struggling financially and had not been able to host its Championship Show on the allocated date in 2023. Generating funds from a Championship Show would serve this Club well in ensuring its continued survival. The newly elected Committee, although small and inexperienced, have put plans in place to steer the Club forward. Every effort ought to be made to assist the Club to grow and continue to be productive and contribute to the system and to KUSA as a whole. KUSA cannot afford to keep losing affiliated Clubs.

The Executive Committee (Exco) would need agreement/approval from the JEC with regard to the RWBA's application to move its show date from Saturday, 30 September 2023 to Saturday, 11 November 2023, which happens to be the November JEC exam date.

This is a once-off request in order to provide the new Chairman, Secretary and Committee with sufficient time to make all the arrangements for this Show. The previous Chairman, who had resigned recently, left the Club with no effective arrangements in place for the Show due to be held on 30 September. The new Committee was unable to go ahead with a Show in 3 weeks' time with the Show Schedule not having been distributed to exhibitors and with no logistical arrangements having been made.

Having perused the KUSA Calendar to find an alternative date, the only available weekend was that of 11/12 November. However, the venue proved to be unavailable on 12 November. The newly affiliated NAPC Northern Areas Agility & Dog Jumping Club would be hosting a Dogsport event in the SAWDOS Arena at Goldfields, the traditional venue for Rottweiler Clubs to accommodate a 60 x 40m ring normally set up for Specialist Shows, and provide sufficient parking space for trailers in the shade. The top grounds at Goldfields, although large enough, are unsuitable, due to the lack of trees and shade. November is traditionally very hot and shade is crucial for the wellbeing of exhibits.

There are only two Rottweiler Candidates registered to write the Rottweiler Specialist exam on 11 November – Mr Johann Fischer, who would not be able to exhibit under his officiating wife, Mrs Letsie Fischer, and Mr Osman Damon based in Cape Town, who had provided email confirmation that he had no objection to the RWBA hosting its Show on the exam date.

[Note: The practice of not allowing Shows on Examination dates was instituted some time ago under a Fedco Directive and is not regulated anywhere.]

	The JEC would advise the Club and the KUSA Office that this was a once-off dispensation, which would not be repeated in future. The KUSA Office would advise Exco accordingly, prior to its meeting on 19 September 2023. For ratification. Mr Hull was requested to be the Webmaster of the FBCSA BC's website, to which he agreed. Mrs Karin Schoeman was again voted onto the Breed Council as a non-voting member, in the capacity of Registrations Secretary. Similarly, Mrs Diane Kee du Plessis was elected as the Council's Treasurer. There was no representation of the Natal Boxer Club, but this may be attributed to the fact that this Club, despite its name, has very few Boxer owners or breeders as members and therefore not hosted any Breed specific events for several years now. The Natal Boxer Club is more focused on the working and training areas of dogdom, which would be fantastic if this was only, or mostly, Boxers working. Nonetheless the Club currently remains associated with the FBCSA BC.
		It was with great sadness that the Breed Council bid farewell to Mrs Jacqui Eisler, who after having served on the Breed Council since its inauguration, decided to leave to focus on more personal matters. Jacqui contributed tremendously to the business of the Breed Council and always approached any tasks in a calm level-headed manner. She was certainly instrumental in getting some of the problems on the BC website identified and was always willing to share her thoughts and ideas. We wish Jacqui all the best for the future and hope to see her serving on the Breed Council again once she's dealt with her personal matters. The Western Province Boxer Club appointed Ms Renee Erasmus to replace Jacqui. We welcome her to the Breed Council and look forward to working with her and to her contribution toward matters addressed by the Council. At an Ordinary Meeting of the Breed Council in February 2023, it was agreed to continue resolving some of the functionality and content issues on the FBCSA BC website. Although many of the issues were tackled throughout 2022, there were still problems being identified and again Mr Ken Hull came to the forefront to investigate and resolve the problems. It was also agreed that Mr Hull would be paid an honorarium for his time and effort in administering the website for the 2023 period. I would like to thank Mr Hull for his efforts and must mention that there has been a noticeable improvement in the website over the last year.

One problem that seems to keep occurring is the renewal of the website domain and hosting fees. In the previous years, this was paid on a monthly basis via credit card payments by Prof Oosthuizen and then claimed back from the Breed Council. This was changed in 2021 to a single annual payment invoiced by the provider to the FBCSA, but there were problems encountered and the website was suspended. After much negotiation and toing and froing the problem was resolved and the website restored but, once again, this year much the same happened, despite attempts to ensure that the renewal went smoothly. My thanks to Mrs Kee for resolving this after almost two weeks of liaising and arranging to get the payment made to the provider from her own account. This needs to be addressed urgently in 2024 so that the situation doesn't arise yet again.

In this regard, I would like to extend my thanks to Mrs Kee for the work that she continued to do in terms of the financials of the FBCSA BC. Thank you, Diane, for ensuring that everything is in order, payments are made and the time you take looking after our finances. We appreciate your commitment. I am pleased to advise that, as at the 31 August 2023, the FBCSA BC had a balance of R62711.11 in its control account at KUSA.

A thank you must also go out to Mrs Karin Schoeman who, despite new pressures at her workplace, dealing with serious health issues in her family and doing her tasks as Secretary and Show Secretary of the Northern Boxer Club, continued to look after the puppy registrations for the FBCSA BC. Karin kept us all in the loop when litters were available as there is still a higher demand for puppies than what are available throughout the year. While I did not have all the statistics available at the time of writing this report, I do believe that there was a slight increase in the number of puppy registrations compared to the previous year. To 30 September 2023, 155 puppies were registered with April being month the highest number of puppies registered (28) and June the lowest with only 3 puppies registered. While this is still significantly lower than pre-COVID-19 figures, it is encouraging to see that there is an increase, and it is certainly hoped that we will continue to see this trend.

The FBCSA BC did not participate in the PetExpo event that took place during July this year, because there were not enough members able to be present over the period of the event. It was therefore decided to not participate, which was rather disappointing but, despite the letdown, the Boxer was nonetheless represented at the event through the hosting of a Championship Breed Show by Northern Boxer Club Inc. The Show went off successfully and congratulations must go out to the winners of the classes and to the winning dogs. I would like to thank the organisers for affording the FBCSA BC and our affiliated Clubs the opportunity to participate in the event. I hope that, with a little more encouragement, the FBCSA BC would be able to participate in 2024.

Despite this, the three represented Clubs managed to host all their events listed on the KUSA calendar for 2023 and each show enjoyed relative success. I was informed that the Western Province Boxer Club had a really successful and fun-filled annual Championship show. Well done to all our Clubs for hosting these events and making sure that our members are able to showcase their fabulous dogs and also allow us as Boxer lovers to expose our lovely Breed to the public.

I would like to encourage our Breeders to strive to do testing of their Dams and Sires to ensure that we produce healthy, world class puppies and can provide our market with dogs that are truly worthy of being called elite stock. Without mentioning particular names, I'd like to thank our breeders who are going that extra mile to do extensive testing of their dogs before placing them into their breeding programmes. It should be the goals of each and every one of us to ensure that we produce only the best quality and that we continue to attempt eradicating the flaws currently plaguing our breed.

The Breed Council continued trying to reestablish the hosting of, and participation in, the Aptitude Test in the Gauteng region and, while it has not yet materialised, we remain hopeful that we will get this active again in the not-too-distant future. We have managed to successfully pique the interest of several persons and we now need to begin driving commitment from Clubs to participate and host these events and then we would need to address getting the required persons qualified in the discipline. Being a working breed, we do not see many working events

hosted by the Boxer Clubs and the FBCSA BC agreed to look into hosting working events such as Breed Assessments, Breed Suitability Tests and Endurance Tests through our affiliated Clubs. This will be pursued with greater emphasis in 2024. In closing off, I would like to thank all of the Breed Council representatives for their time and efforts throughout 2023 and, most of all, for their commitment to the Boxer breed. I hope that 2024 will be a successful year during which we can achieve the goals set for the year. I want to wish all our Clubs and their members a successful, peaceful, and pleasant 2024. I thank all the various Club Representatives from around the country that have made a plan and given up their time and energy to make our GSD breed such a special one. I took over from Sandra Brunner as Chairman at the end of 2022 and we have maintained the goal of improving the quality of the KUSA-registered GSD. The aim of our Council is to promote the ethical breeding, training, and showing of our GSD breed. To that end, the Representatives from each Club should be representing their Club members' views, by taking topics to be discussed back to their Club members and getting their feelings and input, and not just the personal views and agendas of the Representative on the Council. There have been some meetings with lively debate around topics, but this is all to the end goal of improving the GSD breed. There have been quite a few decisions made during the year, including on how a GSD Specialist Show must be run and having grading cards given to the entrants. This ties in with the newer requirements brought in that all dogs need at least a 'Good' grading to be bred from. We have confirmed that elbow and hip gradings are essential for the breeding programme, together with proven DNA. There have been more shows held this year where breed gradings have been given. Unfortunately, we do not have the numbers yet where a National Breed Show can be held. We urge people wanting to buy a GSD puppy to do their homework and only buy a puppy from breeders that have met the breeding requirements and that their puppies have been bred in a safe and healthy environment. Once again, I would like to thank the Club Representatives for their input in making sure that the Council fulfils its purpose and, with the support of KUSA, serves the best interest of the GSD breed. The KUSA Show Dog of the Year will represent South Africa and KUSA at the annual FCI World Challenge event.1 On a proposal from GR, seconded by LT, the proposed housekeeping amendment to Schedule 05E(24) was approved, unanimously. Effective 01.03.2024. 19.5 Ratification of Fedco round robin - Proposed amendments to Schedule 05E(10) -Regulations for KZN Supreme Dog Competition – Dispensation request for 2023 (Fedco round robin 9 November 2023) Submitted by the KUSA Office on behalf of the KZN Provincial Council. Background: The KZN Supreme Dog Competition has not been held since 2017. However, sufficient interest and organising resources are available to run the Competition in 2023 and the Competition has been scheduled for 25 November 2023. Upon reviewing the Schedule, it became evident that amendments were urgently needed to run the event transparently, and to ensure a clear elimination process and determination of the winners (Puppy, Veteran and Adult Dog classes). **Motivation:** Upon reviewing the Schedule, it became evident that amendments were urgently needed to run the event transparently, and to ensure a clear elimination process and determination of the winners (Puppy, Veteran and Adult Dog classes). Proposal: To ensure a fair, easy to understand, judging process, amendments were required to Regulations 7.2, 7.3 and 7.4. JUDGING The Supreme Veteran Competition will be Judged first, followed by the Supreme Puppy Competition and then the Supreme Dog Competition.

7.2 Three (3) [Judges] Officiating Judges.

Preliminary Rounds – Veteran and Puppy Competition

If three (3) local <u>Judges</u> are appointed, the judging will be [done] as follows:

The Supreme Veteran <u>class</u> [Competition] will be judged first, followed by the Supreme Puppy class [Competition] and then the Supreme Dog class [Competition].

The <u>J</u>udges will draw ballots immediately prior to the commencement of the <u>S</u>how to see which <u>class</u> [<u>competition</u>] they will be judging. One <u>J</u>udge will judge the Veteran <u>class</u> [<u>Competition</u>] and one <u>J</u>udge the Puppy <u>class</u> [<u>Competition</u>]. All three <u>(3)</u> <u>J</u>udges will judge the KZN Supreme Dog <u>class</u> [<u>Competition</u>].

All dogs which have qualified in the Veteran or Puppy [Competition] will enter the ring in number order to be judged. After the <u>Judge</u> has evaluated each dog, he[/she] will [short list to 8 dogs which will return to the ring to be evaluated further. He will then] select <u>four (4)</u> dogs, write their numbers on the prescribed form in any order[, and place the form in a sealed envelope], which form will be handed [given] to the Show Manager.

7.3 Supreme Dog Competition

Supreme Dog Competition - First Round

[Whilst the Veteran Competition is being judged all exhibit numbers will be placed in a hat and the 2 judges not judging the Veteran Competition will draw numbers consecutively until all dogs have been allocated. The remaining 12 will be judged by the judge of the Veteran Class.]

The Host Club Committee will split the dogs entered in the adult stakes into three (3) groups of roughly equal numbers. This will avoid exhibitors with more than one (1) dog from being in the same group at the same time. However, if an exhibitor has more than three (3) dogs taking part, he will have to secure assistance to handle the additional dog(s).

[These numbers will indicate dogs the judge will judge and each judge's] A list will be placed on a board so that exhibitors will be able to ascertain which group their dog is in, who they will be exhibiting under, and when they will be judged.

[The judge whose name is first alphabetically will judge first followed immediately by the second judge and then the third judge.]

Each <u>Judge</u> will evaluate <u>all the dogs in each group</u> [his allocated dogs] <u>and</u> short-list <u>each group to four (4) dogs</u>. [which will return to the ring to be evaluated further. He/she will then select 4 dogs,] <u>He will then</u> write their numbers on the prescribed form [in any order, and place the form in a sealed envelope], which <u>form</u> will be <u>handed</u> [given] to the <u>S</u>how <u>Manager</u>.

Supreme Dog Competition – Second Round

The final twelve (12) dogs will then be judged by [the] all three (3) Judges [judge who did not judge the Veteran or Puppy Competition. He/she They will short list to 4 dogs. which will return to the ring to be evaluated further. He will then] Each Judge will select four (4) dogs and allocate those dogs a score of four (4) to one (1), four (4) being the highest score and one (1) the lowest score.

The Host Club's Committee will have a selected team of helpers to calculate the scores. Should there be a tie, a run-off will occur.

At its inception, the SUPA 7s was linked to the Animaltalk Top 100 Rating System and remained that way until the demise of the Animaltalk Top 100 in 2020. This left the club without a method of determining the top 7 Adult qualifiers in each group. The Regulations were changed in 2021, and again in 2022, to accommodate interim criteria which were not ideal and drew much criticism. With the possibility of changes occurring again in the future, we felt it would be beneficial to all to place the selection of which Rating System to use in the hands of the Committee, who would be best able to decide, based on the situation at the time.
	2: To include winners of Best Veteran in Show and Best Puppy in Show at FCI International Shows.

These were specifically excluded at a time when FCI International Shows were infrequent and poorly attended. We believe the frequency of, and increased entries at, FCI Shows currently warrant their inclusion.

3: To clarify the qualifications required of the Judge for the event.

We felt that the Judge should at least be qualified as a Best in Show judge, and have now incorporated that in the Regulations.

4: To allow the Committee to appoint an "outsider" to select, contract and manage the Judge.

Because the identity of the SUPA 7s Judge is kept secret, it is important that the person dealing with the Judge has no involvement in showing a dog at the SUPA 7s. Previously, the Regulations required a Committee member to be tasked with appointing a Judge. Unfortunately, with the shrinking size of Committees currently, this can often be impossible as every committee member is likely to be exhibiting a dog at the event.

Since the next SUPA 7s takes place on 20 January 2024, a mere two months away, we would need to send invitations out shortly, we beg Fedco's indulgence and request that if these changes are approved, we be allowed to implement them with immediate effect.

Proposal:

Proposed amendments to Schedule 05E(15) (1.6) Regulations 4, 5.2 and 10.4.

4. Qualifications for Entry

- **4.3** The SUPA 7s Puppy Stake is by invitation only to dogs which have been awarded Best Puppy in Show at All Breeds Championship Shows ([excluding] including FCI International S[s]hows) held in the KUSA area of jurisdiction in the calendar year prior to the year in which the Competition is being held.
- **4.4** The SUPA 7s Veteran Stake is by invitation only to dogs which have been awarded Best Veteran in Show at All Breeds Championship Shows ([excluding] including FCI International S[s]hows) held in the KUSA area of jurisdiction in the year prior to the calendar year in which the competition is being held.
- **4.5** Each invited entrant shall complete the entry form as prescribed by the Host Club and submit it with a fee which shall be determined from time to time by the Committee of the Host Club.
- **5.2** [Foreign] Judges To be qualified **to judge Best in Show** in **their** country of domicile [according to the Kennel Union rules].

Background and Motivation:

The KUSA Budget for 2022/2023 made provision for the current KUSA Breed Standards, as presented on the KUSA website, to be arranged into a uniform format with a new look and feel. With few exceptions, KUSA's adopted Breed Standards originate either from the FCI, or from the Royal Kennel Club. Although these two sources follow a different format for the presentation of their Breed Standards, it was felt that some uniformity could be achieved in typographical arrangement and visual presentation.

Early in 2023, the complicated Breed Standards Project was outsourced by the General Manager and PM informed the meeting that the Project has been completed and that the KUSA Office would be proceeding with the upload of the re-formatted Breed Standards as soon as a notification has been sent to the membership early in 2024.

Proposal 1:

To update and amend Schedule 02, Appendix A to align with the new Breed Standards' "House Style and Naming Convention" which has been provided.

Proposal 2:

For the Breed Standards Committee to review the following paragraph contained within the Breed Standards Protocol to bring it in line with the new Naming Convention.

Single Breeds with multiple varieties:

Where a single Breed Standard has been adopted for breeds with multiple varieties, distinguished by coat type and/or size, the breed varieties shall be separately listed in Schedule 02 Appendix A and the same Breed Standards shall be published for each variety on the KUSA website.

This paragraph would need to be deleted or amended. (Red text within the paragraph is in conflict with the new "House Style and Naming Convention".)

On a proposal from GR, seconded by MV, Proposals 1 and 2, as contemplated above were accepted, unanimously.

Effective 01.01.2024.

19.10 **Rhodesian Ridgeback Breed Standard**

Background:

In the FCI Breed Standard for the Rhodesian Ridgeback, South Africa is recognised as the Country of Origin with the copyright of the Breed Standard attributed to The Kennel Union of Southern Africa/Zimbabwe Kennel Club, KUSA collaborated with the FCI Breed Standards Commission (FCI BSC) on the Rhodesian Ridgeback Breed Standard, which resulted in a version accepted with effect from 01.01.2020. Subsequent to this date, the FCI BSC proposed additional changes and also particularly required KUSA to re-format the Breed Standard to conform to the FCI's formatting for Breed Standards, as regulated. These changes were made and approved by the FCI BSC.

Although the amended and newly formatted Breed Standard was accepted by the FCI BSC, it was rejected by the FCI Scientific Commission (FCI SC) for various reasons, mainly its non-

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accommodation of the "Ridgeless" Rhodesian Ridgeback, which has remained a sticking point ever since. At the time, Fedco decided to provisionally leave the previous version of the Breed Standard on the KUSA website, until such time as the "Ridgeless" Rhodesian Ridgeback issue had been sorted out within the FCI.

Recently, however, KUSA received an enquiry from the FCI Executive Director, Mr Yves De Clercq, evidently prompted by enquiries he had received from other FCI-member countries, to establish why the Breed Standard of the Rhodesian Ridgeback uploaded to the KUSA website differed from the version on the FCI website. Since this was clearly a matter of international concern, it was necessary to engage the Federal Council on the way forward.

The most recent Rhodesian Ridgeback Breed Standard as submitted to the FCI by KUSA (Country of Origin) contains all the requested nomenclature and formatting changes required by the FCI. It further contains two ostensibly contentious provisions:

One under the *Faults* clause, i.e.

- Incorrect crowns on Ridge and another into the *Disqualifying Faults* clause, i.e
 - Dogs without a Ridge

Presumably, as a result of the difference of opinion between the FCI BSC and the FCI SC, KUSA's latest submission had not yet cleared the FCI General Committee. Apart from the two insertions identified above, which doubtlessly concerned the FCI SC, this version faithfully followed the FCI's required format and nomenclature.

The Chairman recommended to Fedco that, although not yet cleared by the FCI General Committee, the latest version of the Breed Standard should replace the current version on the KUSA website. She further suggested that a suitable rider should be inserted in an appropriate position to the effect that this breed standard was pending acceptance by the FCI General Committee.

GR stated that he had no hesitation in proposing the above interim action. He believed there was little chance that South Africa, as the Country of Origin of the Rhodesian Ridgeback, would ever accept "Ridgeless" Rhodesian Ridgebacks, when it was clearly stated in the Breed Standard that "the ridge is the escutcheon of the breed".

On a proposal from GR, seconded by MV, it was agreed, unanimously, that the KUSA Office should proceed with uploading of the Breed Standard cleared by the FCI BSC, but not yet by the FCI SC. This Breed Standard must contain a rider that it was pending recognition by the FCI General Committee.
